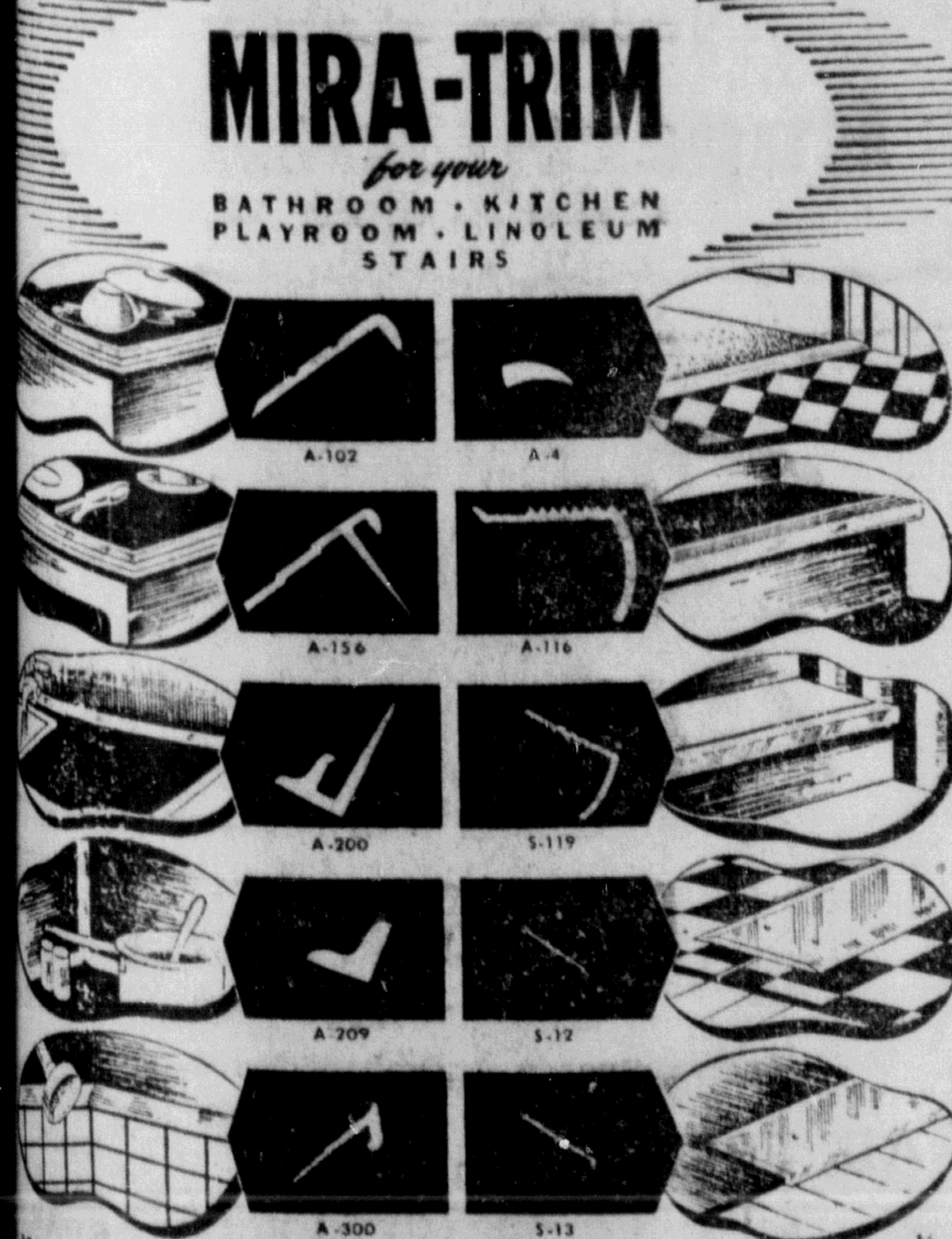

## Garnet "Strike" In City Garden

Prince Rupert had a gold strike a couple of years ago which started up plenty of excitement and now—so help us—it's a gem strike: Not diamonds, but genuine garnets!

It happened the other day in the back yard of Frank Parlette, 515 Cotton Street, when he vigorously attacked a rock outcropping with a hammer to level it off for garden space. A blow of the hammer, the rock shattered and Mr. Parlette began to clear away the fragments.

However, in the centre of shattered rock were a number of small, peculiar looking stones which he examined. Each had a regularly-lined surface of diamond shaped facets which interested the amateur miner. The stones were of a rich, amber-reddish color.

Further inquiry revealed that they might be garnets, a generic term for several types of extremely hard semi-precious stones. They were hard enough to mark glass, just like a diamond. Mr. Parlette uncovered more than a dozen in sizes ranging up to that of a pea. And they could mark glass easily.

## Letters to the Editor

### SALMON NOT AFFECTED

Editor, Daily News:

I would ask that the following  
letter be given publicity owing  
to the misinformed criticism of  
the proposed development by  
the Aluminum Company of Cana-  
da of one million, five hundred  
thousand hydro horsepower, by  
diverting the waters of the  
Tweedsmuir Park watershed, by  
dam and tunnel, to the Coast by  
way of the Kemano river, where  
it enters into Gardner canal.

First: The natural imped-  
iment of falls and rapids in the  
Grand Canyon of the Nechako  
river, has stopped salmon from  
ascending into the waters of the  
Tweedsmuir Park area which in-  
cludes the following lakes: Ootsa,  
Tahtsa, Whitesail, Eutsuk, Tet-  
chuk and numerous smaller ones.

MacKenzie, in his famous trip  
to the Pacific in 1793, found no  
Indians domiciled in that area,  
presumably because there were  
no salmon available for food.  
The "Carrier" Indians were to  
the North and the "Chilcotins"  
to the south.

Second: There is no part of  
the Fraser River watershed that

lends itself to the creating of  
such a vast reservoir, (some  
three hundred miles in circum-  
ference) to aid in the flood con-  
trol of the lower Fraser river.

The enormous financial out-  
lay necessary to complete this  
undertaking could only be just-  
ified by the immense hydro de-  
velopment envisioned.

Third: In the matter of dis-  
placing old settlers in the flood-  
ed area. They could be hand-  
somerly rewarded in what would  
amount to a small item of the  
final total expenditure.

Regarding the exporting of  
electricity—it could be exported  
only in the shape of manufac-  
tured goods.

In conclusion Mr. Editor, I  
might say the only reason I have  
for the foregoing comments is to  
aid in the development of Cen-  
tral-British Columbia.
