Sport Shots

A cartoon in a London newspaper summed up how Englishmen felt after a lowly-rated soccer team from the United States knocked England's representatives out of the world tournament in Brazil. It showed a couple of Cockneys in a London pub agreeing how lucky it is that "the foreigners" haven't taken up darts, one of the favorite indoor sports hereabouts.

In a similar, self-disparaging spirit was the comment by a Yorkshire councillor. Asked to give permission for a soccer match in Royston between the two women's teams. Cooke said he didn't see why not. "It's time we let the women have a go," he said. "The men don't seem to be doing much good."

Other commentators, grimly seeking ways to wipe the grin off the face of the sporting world, said there were lessons to be learned from what happened in Rio de Janeiro. Frank Coles of the Daily Telegraph suggested that the "foremost" lesson is that those who sent the English team to South America hopelessly misjudged the strain that was to be imposed upon the players.

Coles said England's players were "worn out physically" after an exhausting nine-month season at home. "By the end of the season none of the players was fighting fit," he wrote. "They needed a break." Instead, they started a continental tour against Portugal, Belgium, Italy and Holland—"a prime mistake on the eve of a world cup test."

Roy Peskett of the Daily Mail drew a different moral. In his opinion, England lost, first to the United States and then to Spain because her players try to steer clear of rough stuff. "Our men are too gentlemanly. It's all very well being ambassadors and pukka sahibs, but in a street fight you don't play a violin—you use it as a club."

Peskett also called for a team manager who would be given "supreme control" over organization and discipline. The present committee of selectors should be scrapped and the job given to one man whose job would be to instill "more devil and less science."
