"It seems to be commonly considered that, on the death of His Majesty, the King without male issue, the crown would unquestionably descend to Princess Elizabeth," says a provocative article in the Journal. "However, a survey of British constitutional history reveals that there is no precedent to cover such a situation and that what commentary exists is of doubtful value."

The Journal suggests that all doubts should be removed by passing a law in Parliament.

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
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
