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CONTROL OF YOUTH MIND

In these days when a determined effort is being made by certain influences to capture and control the mind of the youth of the democratic countries and subvert them to other ideologies, it is of utmost importance that there should be no carelessness and dereliction of responsibility, particularly on the part of parents, whereby these youth might be diverted from fulfilling a role of citizenship in keeping with the traditions that Canadians hold dear.

So declared F. E. Anfield, president of the Prince Rupert Boy Scouts' Association, in an address yesterday to the Prince Rupert Gyro Club prefatory to the annual observance of Boy Scout-Girl Guide week.

Mr. Anfield did not set up Scouting and Guiding as the only organized extra-curricular activities apart from the school and the church which supplemented the primary responsibilities of the parents in respect to the upbringing of their children although he did claim that the Boy Scout and Girl Guide organizations had stood the test of time with their programs in a changing world. Scouting and Guiding, he pointed out, had been destroyed in the totalitarian nations such as Germany and Russia because their work was that of character building of youth on a base of individual freedom.

The speaker pleaded with fathers whom he addressed to be "partners" with their sons, taking an active interest in what interested them including such activities as Scouting. Lack of parental interest was a tending factor toward frustration of youth which, in turn, could lead to juvenile delinquency.

Mr. Anfield also urged a keen scrutiny and attention on the part of parents to the associations of their children, cautioning against those influences which it was only too well known sought in these times to gain control of the mind of youth.

President Maurice Brydges presided over the Gyro luncheon and thanks to Mr. Anfield for his address were extended by Rupert Fulton.


