FRANCISCO (CP) — President Truman tonight boldly and directly warned Russia the United States will not hesitate about going to resist aggression and defend "our liberties." Truman challenged the Soviet government to "iron curtain" and take other steps toward

the war but we love our chief executive. We will not see them. We want peace but it is peace founded upon that American policy of our republic and it is today than ever before. Truman pledged United States to the support of all Asia to help defend their independence if they asked for it. He said it is plain that the United States, while wanting peace, would not hesitate to go to the Far East or elsewhere where necessary. Truman laid responsibility for the threat to peace in both Asia upon Russia because of their vast armaments and their policy of intimidation and control. He said he must be opposed with force not only by the United States but by all free nations to bring up to the terms of the United Nations Charter to lay down arms. He said the Iron Curtain is operating in a systematic security. Truman had no elaborate speech but made his point with General Douglas MacArthur on the Far Eastern front. He said after delivering his plan, President Truman probably the strongest speech since he delivered Truman's speech in San Francisco, in the building where the United Nations place five years ago.

Florida Is Wind Swept

Five Million Dollars Damage—One Death—Many Injured and Homeless

MIAMI, Florida — One person is known dead and hundreds are homeless with National Guardsmen called out to guard hard-hit districts in a South Florida hurricane area where damage is officially estimated at \$5,000,000. The storm was losing force today as it travelled overland and moved on toward the central Florida citrus belt, leaving destruction in its wake from 125-mile winds. Hardest hit were the communities of Davies, West Hollywood and West Hallandale. In those towns at least 40 homes were destroyed. Seventy-nine trailers were wrecked and many homes damaged. An undetermined number of persons were injured. Sheriff Amos Hall of Broward County made a tour of the three communities and called out 40 men of the Florida National Guard. Davie, town of about 2000, "looks as though a tornado went through it," said Hall. "Substantial homes were destroyed and there is not an undamaged house in the town." West Hollywood, a town of 2000 population, was hit even harder. Twenty-five injured were sent to hospital. Five hundred are homeless. Thirty or 40 homes were demolished and 200 others partly or wholly unroofed. The city of Miami had a 100-mile blow and light and power were off for a time but it suffered no great damage.

WINDSOR — The assembly line of the Ford auto manufacturing plant has been closed for two days because too many cars are failing to pass final inspection. The management says that some of the faulty finishing has been deliberate. Three thousand workers are laid off.

French Yield Another Post

SAIGON, Indo-China — France today announced abandonment of the Indo-China frontier post of Dong Dang, relinquishing for the second time in 65 years of her control of the main invasion route from China. A French military spokesman said the Dong Dang garrison withdrew yesterday. It was the fifth post the French have given up within a month along the mountainous frontier stronghold to Ho Chi Minh's Nationalist Vietminh guerrillas.

Would Reduce Public Works

TORONTO — The Canadian Construction Association today urged the governments—federal, provincial and municipal—to cut their civilian projects by half. The association urged this so that the Canadian defence program may be carried out "efficiently and in the time desired." It would mean cutting projects estimated at one billion dollars to half a billion. The C.C.A., with 800 member firms across the country, made its recommendation in a statement from Robert Drummond of Toronto, its president, following a day-long meeting here yesterday of its management committee.

Quebec Fire "Deliberate"

QUEBEC — Charles Hazen, veteran fire investigator, testified today that he believes the fire aboard the cruise ship Quebec which cost seven lives, was "set wilfully."

Conspirator Escapes Death

NEW YORK — David Greenglass, 28-year-old former Army sergeant, pleaded guilty today in federal court to a charge of conspiracy in time of war to convey secret government defence information to Russia. The chunky defendant, who worked on the atom bomb project at Los Alamos, pleaded guilty to the charge in a firm voice before Federal Judge William Bondy. Because of his plea, it is expected Greenglass will turn a government witness and thereby escape the death penalty.
