Federal By-Elections

THE FEDERAL BY-ELECTIONS in Algoma East, Ontario, and Rosthern, Saskatchewan,

went as expected with Liberal replacements in each case. Any other outcomes would have been of serious significance, particularly since the Liberals had no Progressive-Conservative opposition in either riding.

Mr. Pearson, the new minister of external affairs, had no difficulty in carrying the industrial riding of Algoma East, the principal community in which is the steel town of Sault Ste. Marie. His opposition was not serious.

In Rosthern, Mr. Boucher had a substantial majority over his C.C.F. opponent with the Social Crediter not far behind. The result was in line with the indication of the provincial election this year that a Liberal come-back is under way in Saskatchewan.

WHERE WE CAME IN

AAYBE IT WAS just a bit of wishful thinking 1 to even suggest a few days ago that Russia might have agreed to the compromise proposal of the six neutral nation members of the security council of the League of Nations for a settlement of the Berlin dispute. Undoubtedly it was too much to expect that Russia would have agreed so there was little surprise yesterday when she turned down the whole thing cold.

So the Berlin dispute is just where it was before. The blockade goes on but the air lift mounts in strength and the western powers are determined that it shall be maintained.

Possibly the obducacy of the Russians may have a salutary effect upon the Western Powers. The continuation of the "cold" war will continue to provide the incentive to take defensive measures against a "hot" one.

The fact of the matter is that Russia has failed in her bluff which was designed to have the western powers back down and leave Berlin. She has been called and now she tries to save face. Her policy, no doubt, is to do everything she can short of war to make things tough.

It is probably safe to assume that Russia wants fighting war no more than do we on our side. The situation, however, continues explosive and, as such, is dangerous.

NORA SCORES AGAIN

DRINCE RUPERT and Mayor Nora Arnold get another nice spot of publicity in the October issue of Canadian Home Journal which has been much in demand since its appearance on the news stands a couple of weeks ago. 
