## TO SEEK 'PHONE SYSTEM FUNDS

Delegation to Meet Minister of Municipalities

Arrangements have been made for a delegation consisting of Mayor Nora Arnold, Alderman Thomas Black and City Clerk Thain to meet with the Hon. Roderick Charles MacDonald, minister of municipal affairs, in Vancouver on Thursday of this week. Purpose of the meeting is to ascertain the possibility of the city obtaining a \$500,000 loan to be used for repairing, modernizing and extending the city telephone system.

In August the council had approved sending a delegation of three to meet the government representatives but, when last night's council was asked to approve the proposal Alderman Rudderham expressed the opinion that the delegation should consist only of Mayor Arnold and Alderman Black. Alderman Casey also had objected to sending three delegates but he was in favor of eliminating Alderman Black.

Prior to the discussion and following it Alderman Black stated that, if the council felt the delegation was too large, he would be quite willing to remain in Prince Rupert. In the end the council authorized the delegation of three.

Mayor Arnold arranged the meeting with Mr. MacDonald to coincide with the executive meetings of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities she is attending this week in Vancouver.

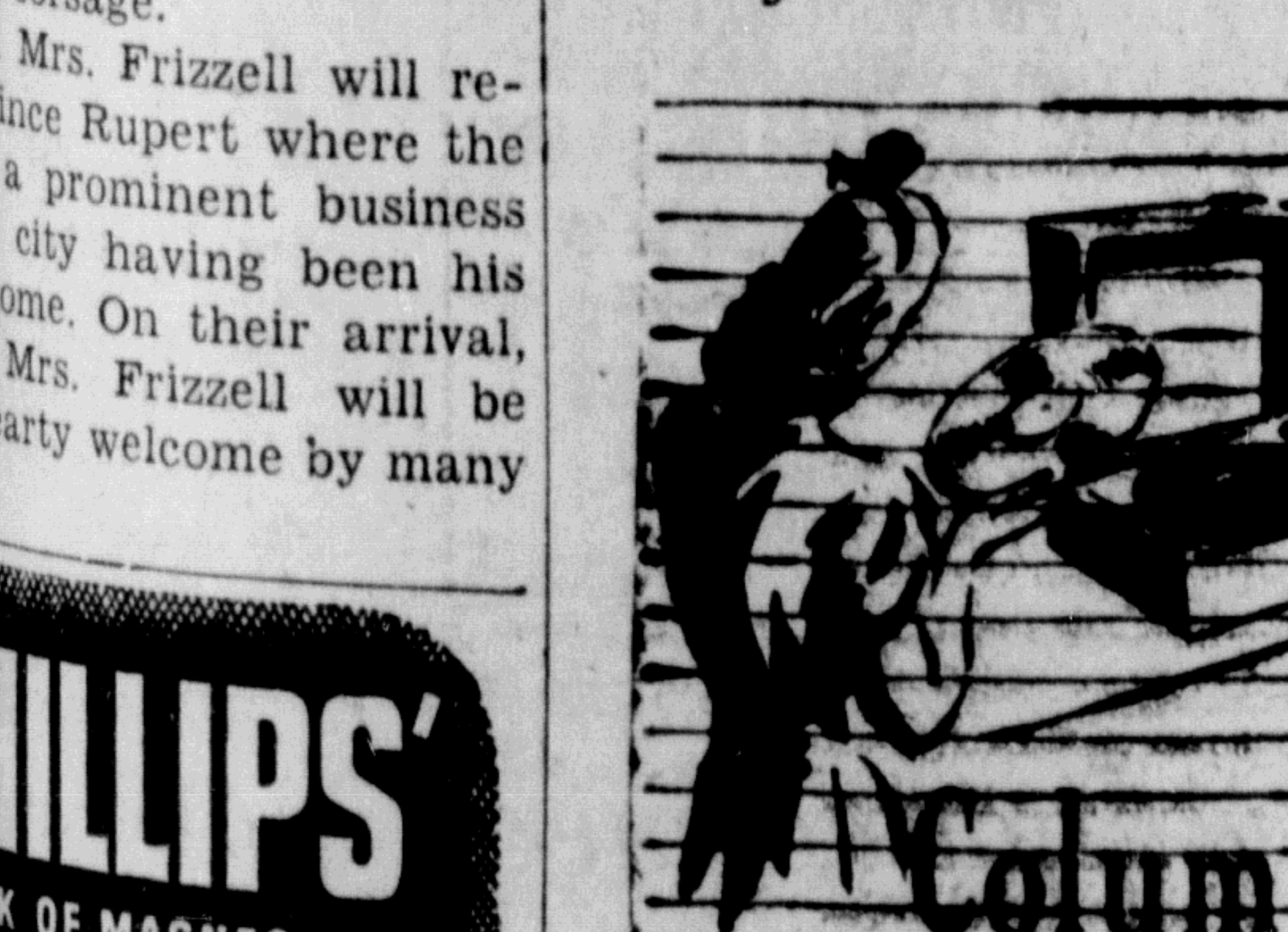
