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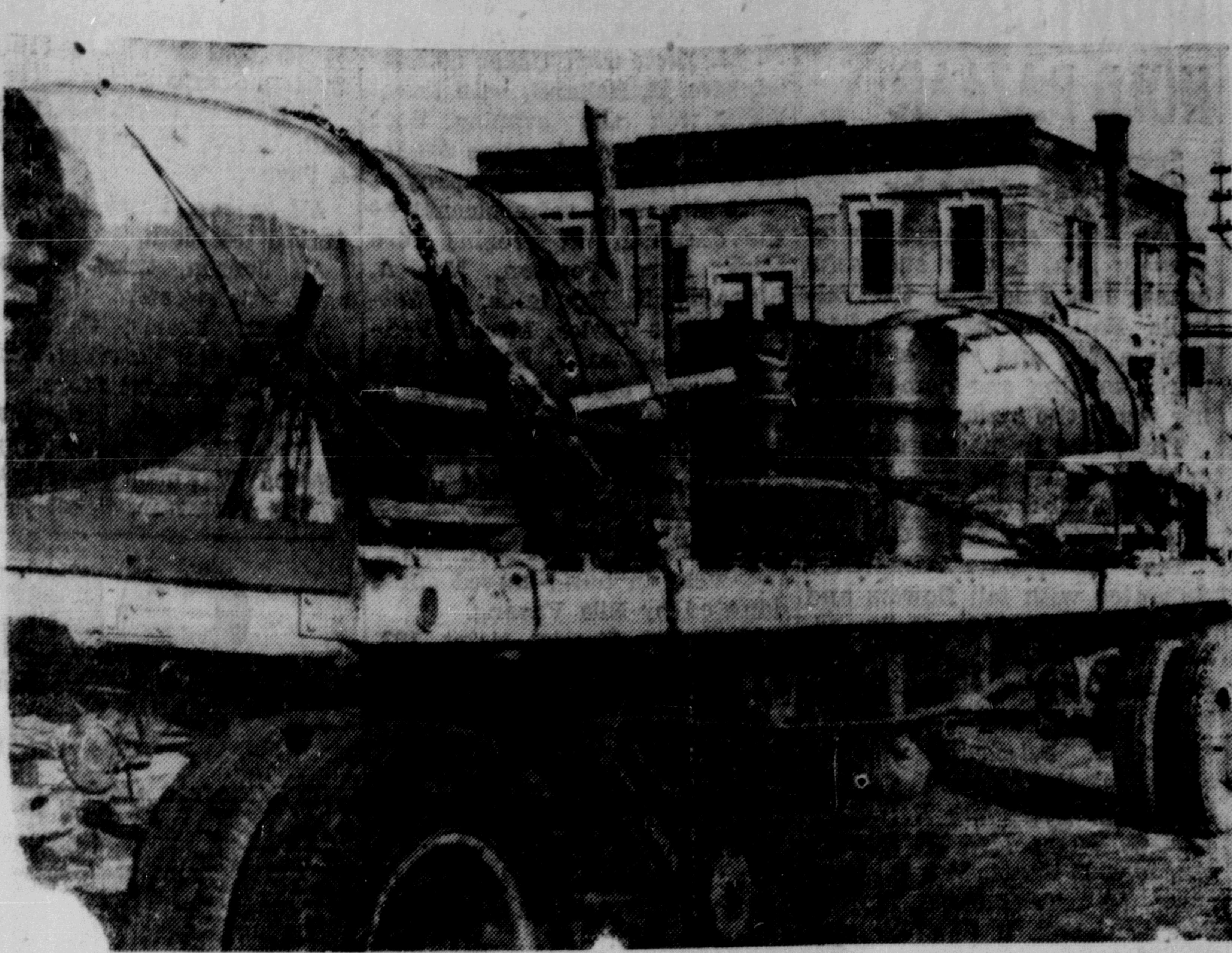

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PARKING BYLAW TO BE ENFORCED

Motorists who have been in the habit of parking their cars on the narrow streets and avenues of Prince Rupert during the hours of darkness without lights are about to find out that they are violating a city bylaw.

The city council last night put teeth in the bylaw by officially requesting the chief of police to "enforce stringently" the parking provisions of the traffic bylaw which requires that no parking be permitted on any street having a graded or paved width of 20 feet or less between the period of one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise unless the vehicle displays standard parking lights both front and rear.

Alderman Robert McKay expressed the opinion that something should also be done about all-day parking in the Post Office Block on Third Avenue. Mayor Arnold pointed out that it would be better to leave that for the present until the avenue was in condition to be zoned with painted lines.
