BATTERY AND LEGION IN SOCCER

In last evening's Gilhuly Cup competition the 120th Battery and Canadian Legion played to a one-all draw. The game was a hard-fought contest and the result is a fair indication of how evenly the teams are matched.

Battery attacked but Nelson cleared. Wyatt and Armstrong combined nicely but Veitch cleared a dangerous situation. Armstrong stumbled when close in. Darrow Gomez gave Brodie a hot handful but the goalie was safe. Holkestad crossed a nice centre but Pavlikis missed. The Battery forwards threatened but Parkhouse shot high over and then Pavlikis missed again. Darrow Gomez was a constant source of danger and Brodie brought off a good save from him. Ward missed a good chance also from Darrow's cross. Veitch stopped Wyatt and Burnip and then the Legion defence got badly tangled up and the ball went in off Dawes with Brodie not having a chance, giving the Battery the lead. In another Battery attack Dawes saved well. Armstrong gave Morgan a hard shot. Burnip gave Armstrong a good opening but the latter delayed too long. Ferguson cleared when the Legion pressed. Veitch fed his right wing nicely but Parkhouse shot high. Greer went off and was replaced by Alexander. Dawes cleared from another good cross by Darrow Gomez. Smith was good and Wyatt showed to advantage but James cleared. Pavlikis missed a chance and then Murray and Armstrong went through but Wyatt missed. The Legion attacked and Morgan made a shaky clearance. Yelland came through with the ball and in the next Battery attack Dawes cleared. Brodie was smart to run out, intercept a centre and clear.

This column would suggest that, when weather conditions are unsettled, the president should be given authority to have announced over CFPR at some stated time, possibly at 5:30, that the game has been cancelled. Failing such a pronouncement the game could be played, with the referee having the final word if conditions at the grounds make it advisable to call off the game.

EDMONTON—Ready for the first challenge to their supremacy in Canadian soccer, members of St. Andrew's team of Vancouver, present Dominion champions, arrived by special car on the Canadian National Railways "Continental Limited, last night and tonight will commence a best of three series with the Legionnaires of that city. Nineteen were in the party, including Manager Johnny Nestman, Coach Tom McNeil, Trainer Gordie Matheson and Secretary Jim Henderson.

With St. Andrew's travelled the Dominion challenge cup which they won last year and which goes annually to the team winning the Canadian championship.
