### WALLACE IS NOMINATED

Candidate of Progressive Party—Glen Taylor is Running Mate  
PHILADELPHIA, (CP)—Henry Wallace was today nominated presidential candidate of the Progressive Party, supporters of which said that the United States has the choice of "Wallace or War."  
Senator Glen Taylor, Idaho Democrat, who left President Truman's fold to become Wallace's No. 2 man, is vice-presidential nominee.  
The Progressive platform declares that, through "good faith" discussions, the United States can find "areas of agreement to win the peace."

### AUSTRALIA ON EVEN TERMS

Following a Poor Start Visiting Cricketers Recover  
LEEDS, Eng. — Following a poor beginning in the second day of the cricket test match being played here, Australia made a good recovery and, when stumps were drawn at the end of the day, had scored 457 runs for nine wickets in reply to England's first inning score of 496. English bowlers got off to an impressive start and, with Bradman out for 33 and Hassett, out for 13 there were three Australian wickets down for 68 runs. But the visitors made a good recovery, Harvey with 112 being the biggest contributor. Even then England seemed to be on the way to establish a good lead in the first inning when they had seven Australian wickets down for 351 but Lindwall, their fast bowler, showed that he could bat too and the last two wickets added 106 runs. Lindwall was 76 not out, and Toshack 12 not out, when stumps were drawn. So with one wicket to fall Australia was only 30 runs behind.

### BOSTON SOX WIN AGAIN

Are Proving Threat Now For American League Pennant  
CHICAGO (CP)—Boston Red Sox continuing their sensational winning streak, which is now making them a real threat for the American League pennant, won their nineteenth straight victory yesterday, defeating Chicago White Sox 13 to 1. They are now but a game and a half behind the Philadelphia Athletics who are trailing the Cleveland Indians by a mere half game.  
In the National League, the Brooklyn Dodgers won again over the Pittsburgh Pirates and reduced to five-and-a-half games the margin of the Boston Braves who suffered defeat at the hands of the third place St. Louis Cardinals.

### COMMUNISTS ARE OUTLAWED

In Federation of Malay and Port of Singapore  
SINGAPORE, (CP)—British officials Friday outlawed the Communist party in the Federation of Malay and the neighboring crown colony of Singapore. The Communists are blamed for a recent campaign of violence in which scores of persons were killed and wounded in a series of disorders.

### GENERAL MOTORS UPS CAR PRICES

DETROIT, (CP)—General Motors Corporation today announced a price increase of about eight per cent on all passenger cars, effective Monday. President E. C. Wilson blamed "rising wages and material costs." The increase follows an 11c per hour boost in wages to workers.

### YOUTH ADMITS 6 MURDERS

Callous 22-Year Old Blandly Defiant—Has Two Regrets  
CELINA, Ohio, (CP)—An unrepentant youth sat unconcernedly in a heavily-guarded cell here today, glibly admitting participation in six cold-blooded murders in 14 days.  
Nattily dressed Robert Daniels, 22, said he had only two regrets—he was sorry his chum, John C. West, 22, had been shot dead by police; he was sorry he had not had a chance to shoot it out.

### Drilling Contract Let For Port Ed. Cellulose Mill

Drilling contracts in connection with the erection of mill and power house structures for the Columbia Cellulose Corporation's pulp mill at Watson Island, general excavation work for which was recently completed, have been awarded to the Pacific Diamond Drilling Co.  
The drilling for dam site, water line tunnels and other establishments of the \$25,000,000 project will be carried out on a cost plus basis.  
Letting of the drilling contracts marks another phase in the big two-year construction program.

### IS PREMIER OF FRANCE

PARIS (CP)—Andre Marie, 51-year old lawyer, whose health was impaired in a Nazi concentration camp, today appeared assured of remaining France's next Premier.  
Marie, a radical Socialist (Conservative), accepted the post and received the National Assembly's confidence today. He apparently will face the outright opposition of only the Communists. Robert Schuman, retiring Premier, approves of Marie. Leon Blum will be his foreign minister and Paul Reynaud his finance minister.  
Under Marie all parties are united except the Communists and the extreme right wing, followers of General Charles de Gaulle. The latter are not expected to actively oppose him.  
Marie, receiving the 311 votes necessary to form the tenth French cabinet since liberation, urged the National Assembly to look forward to the day when the European recovery program must end. He said that a government which does not have its eyes fixed on the day when workers will be thrown into unemployment by closing of factories because of lack of raw materials, is "committing a crime against the nation." The E.R.P. will last four years.

### Are Doubling Air Supply

WASHINGTON, D.C., (CP)—Plan to double the supplies being flown to Berlin gave Russia today, in the words of General Lucius D. Clay, "pretty good evidence" that the Americans will refuse to be chased out.  
The United States command yesterday announced a plan to boost food and fuel shipments following two days of talks with highest United States policy making officials.  
Clay subscribed heartily to President Truman's assertion that chances for peace are excellent.  
"I do not think there is anyone in this world, not even Russia, that is out looking for war at this moment," said Clay.

### ADMITS BOMBING UNITED NATIONS

Former United States Army Flier Held for Mental Examination  
NEW HAVEN, Conn., (CP)—Stephen J. Supina, former United States Air Force flier, bombed United Nations headquarters at Lake Success because he wanted world peace. Today he was placed under \$50,000 bond pending a mental examination.  
The flier, aged 36, said he gave himself up because he was anxious to get back to Lake Success to "finish my fight for world peace." He told reporters that he did not intend to hurt any one when he dropped the missile but did so, "to make them here and abroad look to the United Nations for lasting peace."

### RELIEF OF ARTHRITIS

VICTORIA (CP)—Hon. George Pearson, minister of health, yesterday prepared plans for an inquiry into a new treatment for arthritis evolved by L. F. Green, non-medical man from Port Alberni, who claims he has a formula which brings relief.  
The British Columbia government, with a \$35,000 fund earmarked for arthritis control, is prepared to investigate the claim.  
There are 600,000 cases of rheumatism and arthritis in Canada and 40,000 in British Columbia.  
"Our inquiry," said Mr. Pearson, "will determine whether Mr. Green has anything new."

### Drowned At Ocean Falls

A double drowning which claimed the life of a man and a woman near Ocean Falls was reported to the B. C. provincial police divisional office here this morning.  
Victims of a small boat mishap were Miss Isobel Gordon, of 317 Union Street, Vancouver and Samuel Banks, whose address was not given. Miss Gordon's body was recovered at Koeys a few miles south of Ocean Falls. Banks is still missing.  
Apparently the two people left Namu in a small gasboat at 10 p.m. July 22. The boat was later found unoccupied and out of gasoline in Haki Pass, between Namu and Ocean Falls.  
Corporal MacAlpine of the police boat P.M.L. 7 is investigating.

### Vancouver Fliers in Secret Movement to Jew Airforce

VANCOUVER, (CP)—The Daily Province said today that a Dominion-wide secret movement of fliers, including twenty Vancouver former Air Force officers, is being made to the Jewish Air Force in Palestine.  
The report said that the men had been briefed to ferry Flying Fortresses from the United States to Palestine. The aircraft will be purchased through United States war surplus and flown to South America, thence to Africa and Palestine.  
Informants said that the fliers were obtaining visas for South America from United States immigration authorities here and said that their hands were tied unless there was an official protest.
