Timely Recipe

MEAT LOAF
(Makes 8 servings)

1½ pounds ground beef
1 cup rolled oats
2 beaten eggs
1 cup milk
¼ cup chopped onion
2½ teaspoons salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon prepared mustard

Combine all ingredients thoroughly and pack firmly into a greased loaf pan.

Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 50 minutes to 1 hour. Let stand 5 minutes before slicing.

Variations

Individual Loaves: Mix as above. Bake in 8 greased custard cups in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) about 45 minutes.

Hamburger Patties: Omit the beaten eggs. Shape combined ingredients into eight flat patties; chill thoroughly; pan-fry in hot fat and serve on buns.

Meat Balls: Omit beaten eggs. Shape combined ingredients into sixteen small balls; roll in flour and brown in hot fat. Add favorite tomato sauce and simmer 20 to 25 minutes.

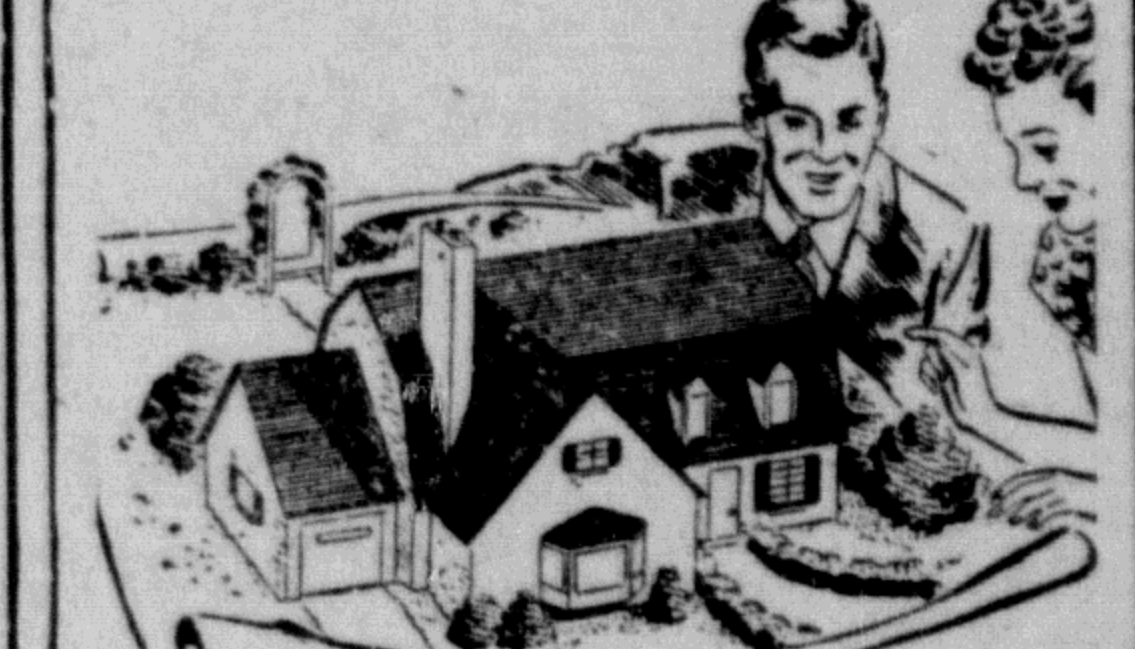
