WASHINGTON, D.C. — (CP) — United Mine Workers of America Union was today found innocent of contempt of court in the soft coal strike. Federal Judge Richmond B. Keech, who heard the case without a jury, announced a verdict of "not guilty on both civil and criminal contempt of court charges." The judge found that the Union had done its best to get

the men back to work but that the members had gone on strike as individuals.

The judge said he had considored the government's petition and had found "on the record" that charges of contempt in the February 11 back to work order had not been supported.

The Union had contended that it was in no way responsible for the refusal of miners to return to work. Its defence was that the 372,000 coal diggers had each quit work by individual decision and not by direction of the union and that officers of the Union had done all they could to end MONTREAL Mrs. Donald the strike.
