United Nations Forces Within Thirty-Five Miles Of Manchurian Frontier

PYONGYANG-Bodies of hundreds of political prisoners have been found in hastily dug pits under jails in which they had been held, having been evidently put speedily to death, regardless of means, as the North Koreans fled before the advancing United Nations forces.

United Nations advance units had advanced today to within 35 miles of the Manchurian frontier, meeting practically no resistance.

Strain of Trip to Korea Believed To Be Too Much

SAN FRANCISCO—Death came suddenly during the night to Al Jolson, famous singer and vaudevillain, who succcumbed here to a heart attack. He had just returned from a trip to Korea where he had given several concerts in quick succession for the United Nations forces. It is believed that the strain of the trip was too much for him. He was to have joined Bing Crosby for
