**Blackwood On Bridge**

When both sides are vulnerable, you should bid your small slams when the chances for success are slightly better than even. To prove this, here is the simple arithmetic of the situation.

If the slam makes, you gain a bonus of 750 points. If it fails, you go set 100 points, you lose the approximately 150 trick points and you lose the 500-point rubber bonus—750 points in all.

I recently saw Mr. Dale play this six heart contract. If the king of trumps is right, the slam makes. If it is wrong, you go set. That is all there is to it.

Personally I would still like to be in six-odd on this hand. Slams are fun and I'll tell you how to prove it.

The next time you are in a slam contract and you are going to be the dummy, try this on your partner. Don't let him see a card of yours until after the opening lead has been made.

Many inexperienced players make the mistake of putting down their trumps before the opening lead. That is not reportant assistance to alert defenders.

When the lead is on the table, start putting your cards down very slowly and very deliberately, one by one. I'll wager you don't get half of them down before your partner practically quired and it may give very im-
