CITY SCHOOL ENROLMENT 1126

Enrolment in Prince Rupert's four public schools during April was 1,126 students, according to the monthly reports of school principals to the School Board. The figure was slightly higher than for the previous month.

Attending the four rural schools in the district were 76, a slight increase over March.

Within the city, Booth Memorial High School had an enrolment of 462 of which 258 were in the junior high and 204 in the senior. Average attendance was 429.

At Conrad Street elementary school, enrolment was 207 and an average attendance of 195. King Edward's enrolment was 268 and average attendance was 252. At Borden Street, there was an attendance of 94 per cent among the student body of 189.

In the rural schools, there was an enrolment of 35 at Port Essington; 10 at Port Simpson; 18 at Digby Island and 13 at Port Edward.
