SHIPS and WATERFRONT

Weather, in the form of wind and rain storms, allied with the pink salmon to foil the seiners in their attempt to fish Massett Inlet during the later part of last week but the fishermen managed to get over 600,000 fish this season which is about five times the number taken in 1946, the last year the waters of Massett Inlet and Naden Harbor were open for pink fishing. However, the storms coming when they did permitted a good escapement of fish to spawning streams. By the end of the week the run was practically over and the big boats were leaving for better fishing grounds. In the south Queen Charlotte area the expected chums have not shown up in any quantity, according to reports. In the Butedale and Bella Bella areas chums are not very numerous either. Last week storms also drove the tuna boats to shelter but there are still hopes that the run is continuing and that the north coast fishermen will get another chance at the fish before they leave the waters off the Queen Charlotte coast.

The big Alaska freighter Sword Knot was in Monday from Alaska with a load of canned fish for transshipment over Canadian National lines to the eastern United States.
