RED RULE IN GERMANY BERLIN- The communistcontrolled "People's Council" today adopted a new constitution for 20,000,000 Germans living under Soviet rule. A 400-man body, established by the Soviet-picked politicians of Eastern Germany, rubberstamped a basic law embodying Communist principles for the entire Russian zone and also the Russian sector of Berlin.
