At the final meeting of the  
Prince Rupert Teachers' Asso-  
ciation for the school year 1947-  
48, held on Tuesday evening at  
the Civic Centre with J. S. Wil-  
son, president, in the chair, the  
sum of \$40 was voted to the B.C.  
Flood Emergency Fund. This  
donation is in addition to con-  
tributions being made indi-  
vidually by the teachers.

A letter from the secretary of  
the Trades and Labor Council  
requesting the association to af-  
filiate with the local council was  
read and considered. General in-  
terest in affiliation was shown  
but it was decided to defer de-  
finite action until the fall.

A highly interesting black-  
board sketch talk on the pro-  
posed new junior-senior high  
school was given by A. M. Hurst,  
chairman of the school planning  
committee. Various possible  
items that might be included in  
the new building were sug-  
gested.

At the conclusion of the meet-  
ing a beautiful picture of Butze  
Rapids was presented to Miss  
Freda Hall by J. S. Wilson on  
behalf of the association. Miss  
Hall, who is to be married this  
summer, in her reply, expressed  
her regret that it was necessary  
to leave the teaching profession  
and Prince Rupert.

dividend of 4.87% was declared.

and Mrs. Farquhar for one year,  
to complete a vacancy. The of-  
ficers were elected on Tuesday  
evening.

Kerr, went out to Skeena Cross-  
ing on Monday for a supply of  
hay. Also taking the trip for  
the same purpose were R. Judd  
and H. Smith and the shortage  
of hay in the town will be re-  
lieved to a certain extent.

All the damage from the  
Skeena flood has been outside of  
the village limits.

## The Experts Say - -

Now that the picnic season is  
in full swing, housewives are on  
the lookout for new sandwich  
spreads.

Home economists suggest a  
cheese sandwich spread, which  
may be stored in a sealer and  
used for making sandwiches on  
a moment's notice.

Ingredients: Two hard-cooked  
eggs (chopped), one pound  
grated cheese, four tablespoons  
minced onion, one-half teaspoon  
salt, two tablespoons flour, one-  
quarter cup vinegar, one cup  
evaporated milk, dash of cay-  
enne pepper.

Add the grated cheese, onion  
and salt to the chopped egg.  
Melt the butter in a double boil-  
er; add sugar and flour, blending  
well. Add vinegar, milk and pep-  
per while stirring, and cook over  
hot water until thickened. Com-  
bine with the cheese mixture  
and store in refrigerator. Yield:  
three cups.

Muffins with jam or honey  
make a dessert that is welcomed  
by every member of the family.  
Here is a recipe which makes 12  
medium-sized, rich, dark bran  
muffins.

Ingredients: 1½ cups sifted  
all-purpose flour, ¾ teaspoon  
baking powder, one-half tea-  
spoon salt, two tablespoons of  
sugar, one cup bran, one egg,  
one cup milk, two tablespoons  
molasses, two tablespoons melt-  
ed shortening.

Mix and sift flour, baking

powder and salt. Add sugar and  
bran. Beat egg, add milk, molas-  
ses and melted shortening. Make  
a depression in the dry ingredi-  
ents, pour in egg mixture. Stir  
only enough to combine. Fill  
greased muffin tins two-thirds  
full and bake in a moderately  
hot oven for 20 to 25 minutes.

VEGETABLE DINNER—A veg-  
etable dinner once a week is one  
method of bringing the family  
food budget into line by cutting  
down on meat purchases. Here is  
a vegetable pie.

Ingredients: One cup diced  
carrots, one cup cauliflower,  
two cups well-seasoned white  
sauce, one teaspoon minced  
parsley, one cup peas or string  
beans, one teaspoon of minced  
onion.

For this recipe left-over veg-  
etables may be used. Place them  
in casserole, cover with white  
sauce. The addition of a mashed  
potato crust makes this into a  
delicious one-dish vegetable lun-  
cheon or dinner. Bake in a hot  
oven. Serves four.

EGG - VEGETABLE CAS-  
SEROLE—Or try this egg and  
vegetable casserole.

Ingredients: five hard-cooked  
eggs, sliced; two cups diced cook-  
ed potatoes, one cup diced cook-  
ed celery or other vegetable, one-  
half cup dry bread crumbs, two  
cups well seasoned medium  
white sauce, one tablespoon  
chopped chives.

Add all ingredients except the  
bread crumbs to the hot white  
sauce; pour into a well-greased  
casserole dish and top with  
bread crumbs. Bake in a hot  
oven about 15 minutes, or until  
brown. Serves six.

## Proud of New Ship

Capt. E. B. Caldwell Tells  
Newspapermen About Prince  
George

VANCOUVER—"I am very  
proud to be the first master of  
TSS Prince George, particularly  
so because it was designed and  
built right here on the coast. It  
is a fine example of British Col-  
umbia workmanship," declared  
Captain E. B. Caldwell today  
during a chat with newspaper-  
men on the new ship.

"The new ship has good man-  
oeuvrability and is smooth in  
its operation with a noticeable  
lack of vibration, a feature that  
is sure to meet the approval of  
the passengers. Nothing has  
been forgotten in the matter of  
navigational aids. The master  
magnetic compass is reflected  
into the pilot house which gives  
the ship's officers a double check  
at all times.

"I am sure the Prince George  
will be a popular ship on the  
northern run as the public  
rooms are well placed and com-  
fortable. A unique feature is the  
alternating electrical current  
and the fluorescent lighting.  
Generally speaking there is a  
homey atmosphere second to  
none," Caldwell declared.
