U.N. Victory in Korea May Defer World War for Years

TOKYO -High military circles here believe the United Nations victory in Korea has postponed a possible third war for years. They say that Russia has been surprised by the Allied intervention in Korea and is stunned by the strength mustered in less than four months.

The same sources add that Russia is not ready yet to risk all-out war but will continue designs on world-wide imperialistic control while avoiding any policy that might lead to general war.
