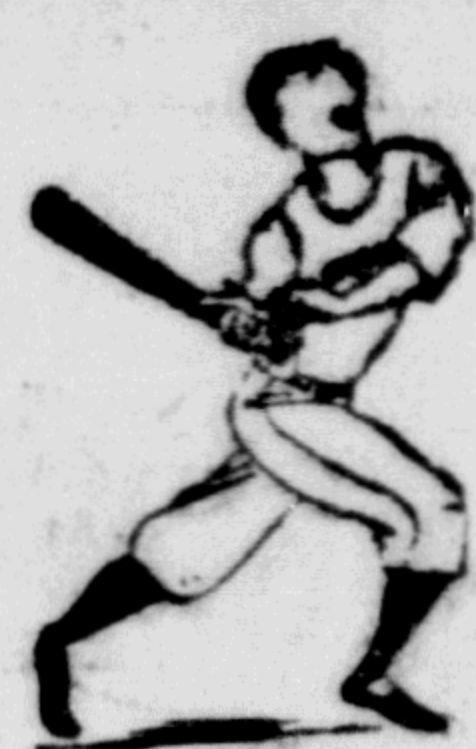

VANCOUVER CLOVER LEAFS ROBBED GREATEST HONOR, OLYMPICS TRIALS

VANCOUVER—An old saying goes "the best team doesn't always win" and some Pacific Coast sports writers are bemoaning the fate of Vancouver Clover Leafs as a case in point.

The basketballing Leafs, who won the Dominion title last year as the meralomas and successfully defended their crown earlier this month, failed to make the grade in the Olympic trials.

Some sports scribes feel they never had a chance.

Bill Dunford of the Vancouver Province says the "Leafs finished off one of the toughest sport junkies in some time by collecting a title as hollow as the hollow tunnel. To make a service club holiday... Laurie Irwin, sultan of the Canadian Amateur Basketball Association, has made them a burnt offering."

Leafs defeated Montreal Y.M.H.A. three games to two in the Canadian final. The following two evenings, Leafs and Y.M.H.A. jousted again in Toronto on the same bill were the University of British Columbia Thunderbirds and University of Western Ontario Mustangs.

The Leafs lost sudden-death

tiffs with Montreal and the Mustangs. Thunderbirds, in turn, whipped the Mustangs and Y.M.H.A. officials announced that Montreal and U.B.C. coaches would select the two teams to represent Canada in London.

Dunford contends the Leafs were victim of the law of averages.

"They should never have been put in a position where the law of averages and the natural let-down following a cross-Canada trek to the title could play such a disastrous trick."

TOUGH SCHEDULE FOR LEAFS

"Leafs played 14 games in 22 days. They travelled more than 2,500 miles to do it. In the east they feel the Leafs should have automatically qualified for the finals, the other clubs playing off for the right to join them."

"The C.A.B.A.," says Dunford, "with its usual ineptitude, has succeeded in forming an Olympic team on which the best team in the country will be represented only by the kindness of either Thunderbirds or Montreal."

Alf Cottrell of Vancouver Sun also lays the blame on the C.A.B.A. officials.

"Canadian basketball officials have gotten off a few honeys this winter but they never booted anything higher than the Olympic trials which have been exposed to hoop fans in Toronto."

"If the whole Toronto show was for laughs only it is only fair to admit they have brought down the house. Everywhere you hear folks wondering out loud if the basketball bosses know any more good ones."
