

N.H.A. DESIGN-OF-THE-MONTH



Here is an attractive house in the popular bungalow style which has been designed especially for narrow properties. The frontage of the house is approximately 21 feet and cost has been held to the minimum without sacrificing all the features of good planning and essential accommodation.

Featuring two bedrooms, bathroom, living room, separate dining room and kitchen, the plan arrangement affords the necessary privacy and communication between rooms without undue hall space.

For those who object to use of the living room as a passageway, the kitchen arrangement, which provides easy access from the front to the rear of the house, may have strong appeal. Use of the kitchen for this purpose has been accomplished without destroying its more important function. The housewife necessary preparation and service entrances to the kitchen, a consideration which will save her many steps during meal preparation.

Under the terms of the National Housing Act, 1944, financial assistance is available to Canadians wishing to build new houses such as the one illustrated.

FLOOR PLAN

Dimensions of the plan are so arranged that the house may be built in frame, solid brick or brick veneer. The area of the house for estimating purposes is 800 square feet.
