

SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

Southbound from an Alaska cruise with full list of round trippers, C.P.R. steamer Princess Kathleen, Capt. Graham Hughes, was in port from 9 a.m. to 12 noon Sunday. Those on board reported having had a delightful swing around important southeastern Alaska ports and points of scenic interest under ideal weather conditions.

Union steamer Coquitlam, which has been out of service for the past three weeks due to damage sustained in a strand-

ing at Massett, will be back on her regular run again this week-end. She will arrive Friday afternoon from Vancouver, sailing that evening for south Queen Charlotte Island ports whence she will return here Sunday to sail at 1 o'clock that night on her return south.

On her regular weekly voyage in the Vancouver-Prince Rupert-Alice Arm - Stewart service, Union steamer Camosun, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon from the south, sailing

northbound at 11 p.m. She will return here tomorrow morning to sail at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints.

Largest vessel of the company's coastal freighting fleet, Frank Waterhouse steamer Chilkoat, Capt. Mike Uldall, arrived in port at 1 o'clock Sunday morning from the south and, after discharging and loading here, sailed at noon for Massett and Port Clements whence she will return here tonight or tomorrow morning. The Chilkoat is commanded by Capt. Mike Uldall and this is her second visit to this port. A converted China Coaster, she has been in the Frank Waterhouse service for the past couple of years. She had four passengers from Vancouver and three from here for Massett Inlet.

Carrying 230 passengers, the majority of them round trip tourists, C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise docked here at 11 o'clock this morning bound for Ketchikan, Juneau and Skagway. He Princess Louise was under command of Capt. W. C. Hubenet.

LARGE DOPE HAUL AT HONG KONG

HONG KONG (C)—Opium and heroin valued at about \$125,000 were seized at Kaitak air field. It was described as the biggest haul of narcotics in the history of this British crown colony.

FRANK PUTNAM VISITS NORTH

In line with the large industrial development which is materializing in north and central British Columbia, there should be a corresponding expansion in land settlement and agriculture in the opinion of Frank Putnam, until recently provincial minister of agriculture, who paid a brief visit to the city yesterday on his way to the central interior. Mr. Putnam spoke of the gradual and substantial movement of new immigrants and predicted a back to the land movement.

Mr. Putnam and William McGillivray, director of development and extension of the Department of Agriculture, arrived on the Camosun yesterday afternoon from Victoria and proceeded by car last evening to Terrace. They are visiting land clearing operations of the department in that area and with Hon. E. T. Kenney, minister of lands and forests, at Lakelse Lake today. Accompanied by S. G. Preston, former district agriculturist at Smithers, they will go on from Terrace tomorrow to Telkwa where they will meet Hon. Harry Bowman of Prince George, the new minister of agriculture, and continue through the district.

At the conclusion of this trip, Mr. Putnam will proceed to his large ranch at Creston after sixteen years in public life. It was Mr. Putnam's first visit to Prince Rupert although he has been through the central interior before in his ministerial capacity.
