Jack McRae, Pioneer Local Boy, Young Business Man, Naval Officer

John Duncan (Jack) McRae, Prince Rupert's M.L.A.-elect, is a member of a well known pioneer family of 40 years' standing, prominent young local business man and former nava officer. He was born 33 years ago in San Diego, California, while his mother was on a visit there. He is the elder son of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. McRae, now residing at Duncan, Vancouver Island and at present visiting here.

After obtaining his elementary and High School education here, Jack McRae attended University of British Columbia where he was secretary-treasurer of his class. Returning to Prince Rupert from college, he joined the staff of his father's stationery store, McRae Bros. Ltd.

On September 10, 1939, one day after the outbreak of World War II, he joined the Searchlight Battery here as a private but soon transferred from Army to Navy as a sub-lieutenant. He won quick promotion to lieutenant-commander. After instructional service at H.M.C.S. Naden on this coast and H.M.C.S. Cornwallis on the East Coast he went afloat, specializing in gunnery, and saw service at Scapa Flow, off the Norwegian coast and in the Mediterranean, off North Africa. He put in destroy-er time on the Atlantic convoy service in 1942-43. During one of the early Victory Loan campaigns, he attained considerable distinction on being chosen as representative of the Navy in a "Carry the Torch" flight across Canada, the torch going on to Britain as a symbol of Canada's support of the war effort. In 1943 he was the admiral's gunnery officer on the Atlantic and his final assignment before the end of the war was as first lieutenant of H.M.C.S. Puncener, then Canada's only aircraft carrier.

In club and fraternal circles he is also known as a member of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club and Tsimpsean Lodge A.F. & A.M. The Navy continues as one of his principle interests and he is commanding officer of the local naval division, H.M.C.S. Chatham.

Mr. McRae was married at Wolfville, Nova Scotia, in 1945, to Miss Grace Oxner. At present he is engaged in building a fine new home on Fourth Avenue West.

WINNER, LOSER MAKE REMARKS

In a post-election statement last night after his victory had been assured, J. D. McRae, Coalition M.L.A.-election for Prince Rupert, assumed with seriousness the duties and responsibilities which his office will involve. "Now I'm elected," Mr. McRae said, "I am prepared to do my fighting on behalf of this riding. I feel the work has just begun." Mr. McRae expressed appreciation of the clean campaign which had been put up by W. H. Brett and the C.C.F.

MR. BRETT DISAPPOINTED

"Now that the election is a past issue, my firm determination is to do everything I can to fulfill the confidence that the electorate have placed in me," said Mr. McRae, who is believed to be the youngest M.L.A.-elect in the province. "I am now prepared to fight, within the party if I must, for the rights of this area," he promised.

"I should like to call to the attention of all rural communities which I have visited and those which I have not yet visited that I have their interests at heart as much as my home town of Prince Rupert."

"I also feel strongly encouraged that Prince Rupert has so substantially supported one of its own sons."

Mr. Brett also spoke briefly. He admitted that the result of the election, particularly in the province as a whole, had been "somewhat disappointing." He also commented on the clean fight. He trusted that, now he was elected, Mr. McRae would do the best he could to carry out the promises he had made. After all the most important thing was the welfare of the common man. In spite of temporary reverses, he was still convinced that the C.C.F. had a message that should still be carried along.

Mr. Brett, C.C.F. candidate, who served four years in the last house, said that he and his party considered their defeat only a "temporary setback."

"The C.C.F. party has had many setbacks but they will continue fighting."
