HUMILITY IS HIS SUBJECT

Life Story of Judge Who Became Salvationist Is Told

Life story of a judge in the Indian Civil Service who re- linquished that exalted position to join the Salvation Army and "go into all the world to preach the gospel," suffering imprison- ment and indignity before be- coming one of the international leaders of the Army, was told by Col. Joseph Tyndall, visiting Salvationist, who has held high administrative posts in various parts of the world, in speaking Wednesday night at the local Citadel. The citation was used as a graphic example for a dis- course on "Christian Humility."

As the Master had washed the feet of his disciples so might Christians exemplify the spirit of humility that they might more effectively carry on the Christian duty of making a better world through self-for- getfulness and consideration of the other man, said Col. Tyndall.

The career example was that of Judge Fred Tucker of India who, actuated by seeing the need for Christian ministration, had relinquished his position in the Indian Civil Service, offering his services to General William Booth by whom he was sent back to India. Arriving with flag and drum, he was promptly thrown into jail for disturbing the peace and inciting unrest. Released, he then donned native garb and preached throughout the land for some years. Ulti- mately, he assumed the com- missionership for India, leading the great evangelical movement which he had founded in that land. He also became Commis- sioner for the United States and married General William Booth's daughter.

Brigadier J. T. Gillingham presided over the meeting and Mrs. Tyndall also spoke. Mrs. Andrew Martin, who is visiting here with her husband, Major Martin, sang. Mrs. A. Perry pre- sided at the organ.
