

Harrowing Scenes As Patients Are Trapped In Fire

Screaming Mental Patients Struggle at Barred Windows

DAVENPORT, Iowa (CP)—Twenty-six women are known dead and eleven others are presumed dead as a result of a fire which swept through the mental ward of the city's largest hospital today. Fire Chief Les Schick said that the dead consisted of women patients and one nurses' aid. There were sixty-one women and three men in the

The fire broke out in the three storey St. Elizabeth's section of Mercy Hospital about 2 a. m.. The 60-year old brick structure was virtually destroyed before the firemen could bring it under control four hours later.

Screaming mental patients, who could be seen at the windows, and calm attendants were trapped. The way to safety for many of them was blocked by barred windows.

Coroner Wildman said that the bodies of twenty-six women had been removed up to noon today and eleven others were believed to be dead in the still smouldering debris. Wildman said that thirty-seven others were injured thus accounting for the 68 persons said to have been in the
