Tight Race In Bowling

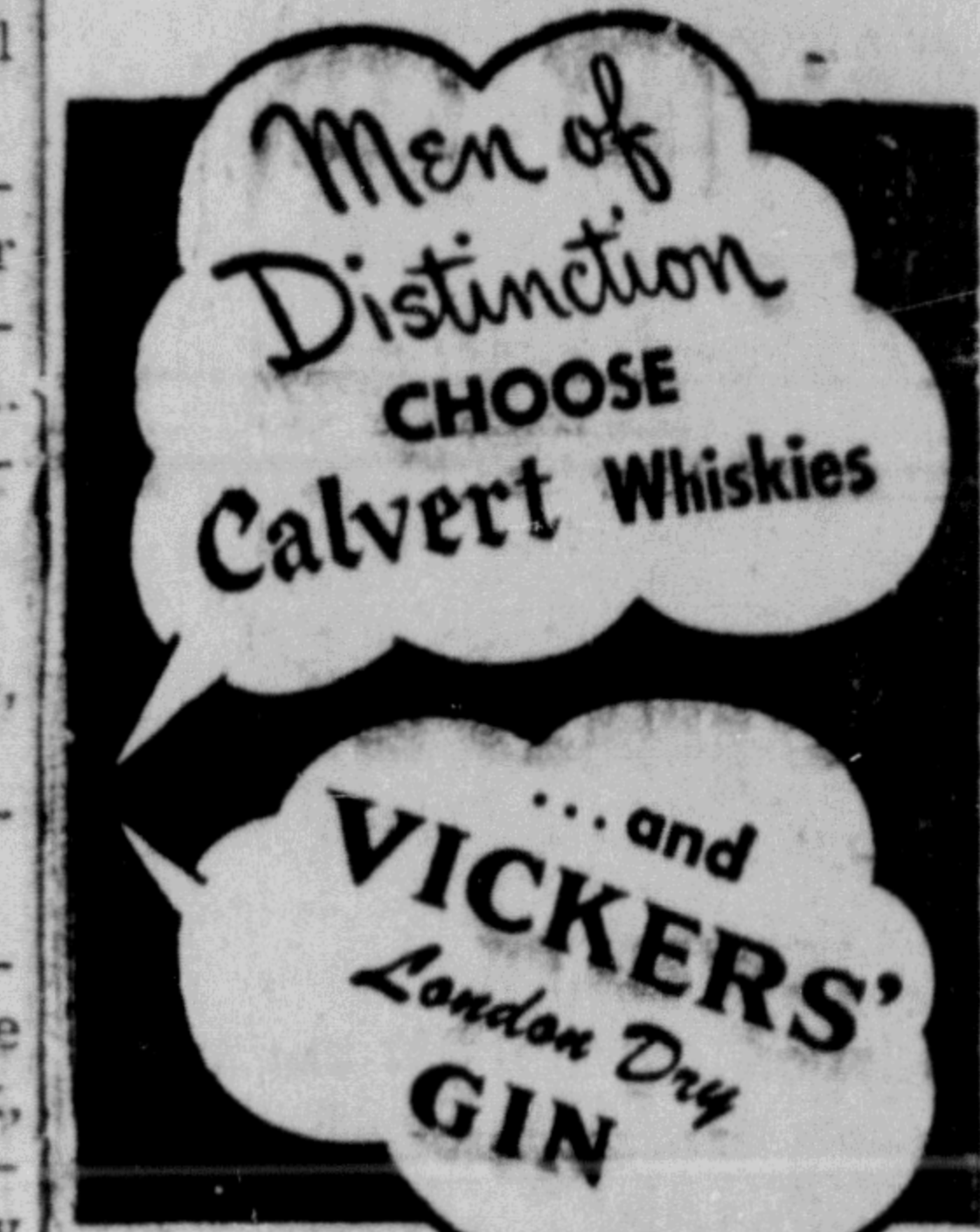

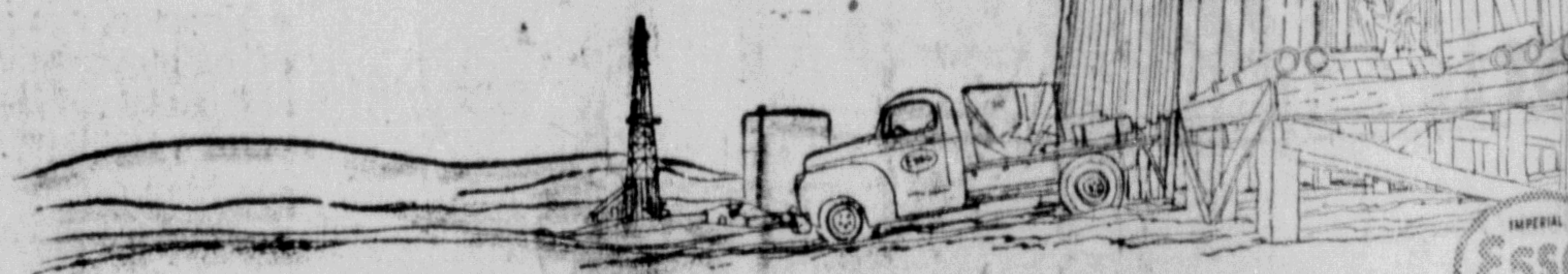
