### Don't Cross Line In Korea Cancelled

TOKYO — A spokesman at Gen. MacArthur's headquarters said today the "mission of United Nations forces is to clear Korea." That was in answer to questions as to whether there is a line south of the Manchurian border which American and British troops are not to cross. Earlier a "don't cross line" was reported drawn 20 miles south of the Manchurian frontier. Later the order was reported withdrawn.

### Aggression Is Worst Crime

United Nations Assembly  
Asked by Western Powers  
To Brand It

LAKE SUCCESS — Great Britain, United States and four other countries yesterday asked the United Nations General Assembly to brand open or fifth column aggression "the greatest of all crimes against peace and security throughout the world."

The resolution was introduced as the western answer to the Russian "peace" plan asking for armaments reduction and the branding as a war criminal the first government to use the atom bomb.

## U.S. MARINES MAKE ANOTHER LANDING

### EISENHOWER FOR SUPREME COMMAND

WASHINGTON, D.C. — It was reported today that North Atlantic Pact military men will recommend that an American be appointed without delay as supreme commander of the combined western European defence force. Gen. Dwight Eisenhower may be given the post, it was reported here.

SEOUL (CP) — The Allied spearhead reached Communist China's Manchurian border tonight as South Korean patrols raced unopposed to the south bank of the Yalu River. They were the first United Nations troops to complete the long thrust up the mountainous peninsula.

### Canada Aids Dutch Army

OTTAWA — A Dutch Army Division will be the first North Atlantic Treaty force equipped with Canadian arms under Canada's \$300,000,000 arms-assistance program for Europe, Hon. Brooke Claxton, minister of national defence, announced yesterday.

Mr. Claxton said that armament equipment for the division, consisting of about 15,000 men, had been approved by the cabinet for immediate shipment. One shipment will leave Montreal about mid-November and another from Halifax later.

## Inspiration In Miss Faure's Paintings At Civic Centre

Display This Afternoon and Evening  
Exudes Atmosphere of Locale—  
Local Artist Philosophizes

Even Johnny's question "Where do babies come from?" is not so profound as "What is Art?" The answer to "What is Art?" may be found in the Civic Centre at Miss Jeanne Faure's display of 28 autumn landscapes. Her exhibit will be shown this and Friday afternoon and evening.

Although the public will be inspired by these oils, climaxing over 50 years of painting experience by the artist, these canvasses do not give away the answer to "What is Art?"

The spectator must take it. To take the inspiration from a canvas, let the taker be as still as the Telkwa forest where Miss Faure has stood painting for the past two months.

Let the spectator enjoy the colors of the trees; let him feel the thought of the changing skies and reflecting waters that Miss Faure loves to paint. Moonlight sketches, a favorite with the artist, are shown in charcoal and crayons.

She explains the striking clarity found in the water of a Telkwa painting by saying: "I looked so long at that reflection that it should be clear."

Perhaps because Miss Faure always completes her work in the outdoors, winter or summer, is why there is the authentic air and almost the smell of woods found in her paintings.

"When I'm painting," I don't feel the cold but stay there all day with my lunch. I've worked in the middle of winter with a water bottle at my feet," says Miss Faure who studies nature. "The altitude is so different even between Prince Rupert and Telkwa—it is more lively at Telkwa, this changes the tone of the picture."

"I have now realized how much there is to see—beauty is everywhere. You must open your soul to life, you can't just look at a thing and value it coldly. You must feel instinctively what it is. Then express something definite, not just globs of paint."

"Art's task is to strengthen

the soul of mankind; to impress them that there is something higher than the struggle for existence; something more dependable than mortality," Miss Faure believes.

Extreme modernism is scorned by Miss Faure, trained in the realistic schools of Holland and Italy.

**IDEA OF MODERN MUSIC**  
"If I could draw cats I would draw a cat on a table plucking a violin and seven tom-cats below yowling—that is my idea of modern music," said Miss Faure, who feels the same about painting.

"In Holland a lady brought a painting of pink and white spots to my studio. She said that it was called 'Mother's Love.' I have no use for this modern painting."

"If people can't understand the work, what's the use of doing it? Painting takes time. We must bite hard before we get to the fruit inside."

"Many times I despair at my work but I keep on working. I have learned from experience that at those times I am usually doing my best work. "Nature expresses Beauty: so if I can make people aware of that I am content. I don't set out to teach in my pictures. There is a difference between my thoughts and the thoughts that the scenery of stumps might give me. It is what God wills: so many of us like to think that God needs a helping hand."

### Canada and United States Are Pooling Defence Resources

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Canada and the United States, in an unprecedented move, formally agreed today to co-ordinate their resources, skills and economies for "common defence" of both countries.

Rt. Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of trade and commerce, said the agreement marks a new advance in peacetime economic co-operation.

The agreement provides for common supply of strategic materials through an interchange of technical knowledge and creation of allocation and priority controls.

## Chinese Reds Marching In

BERLIN (CP) — The Russians announced today that Chinese Communist forces had crossed Tibet's frontier early Tuesday. It was the first word that Chinese Reds had actually entered Tibet.

The Peiping radio yesterday announced that Chinese Communist forces from South China had been ordered to advance to Tibet.

The Chinese Reds have been hinting at an invasion for several months.
