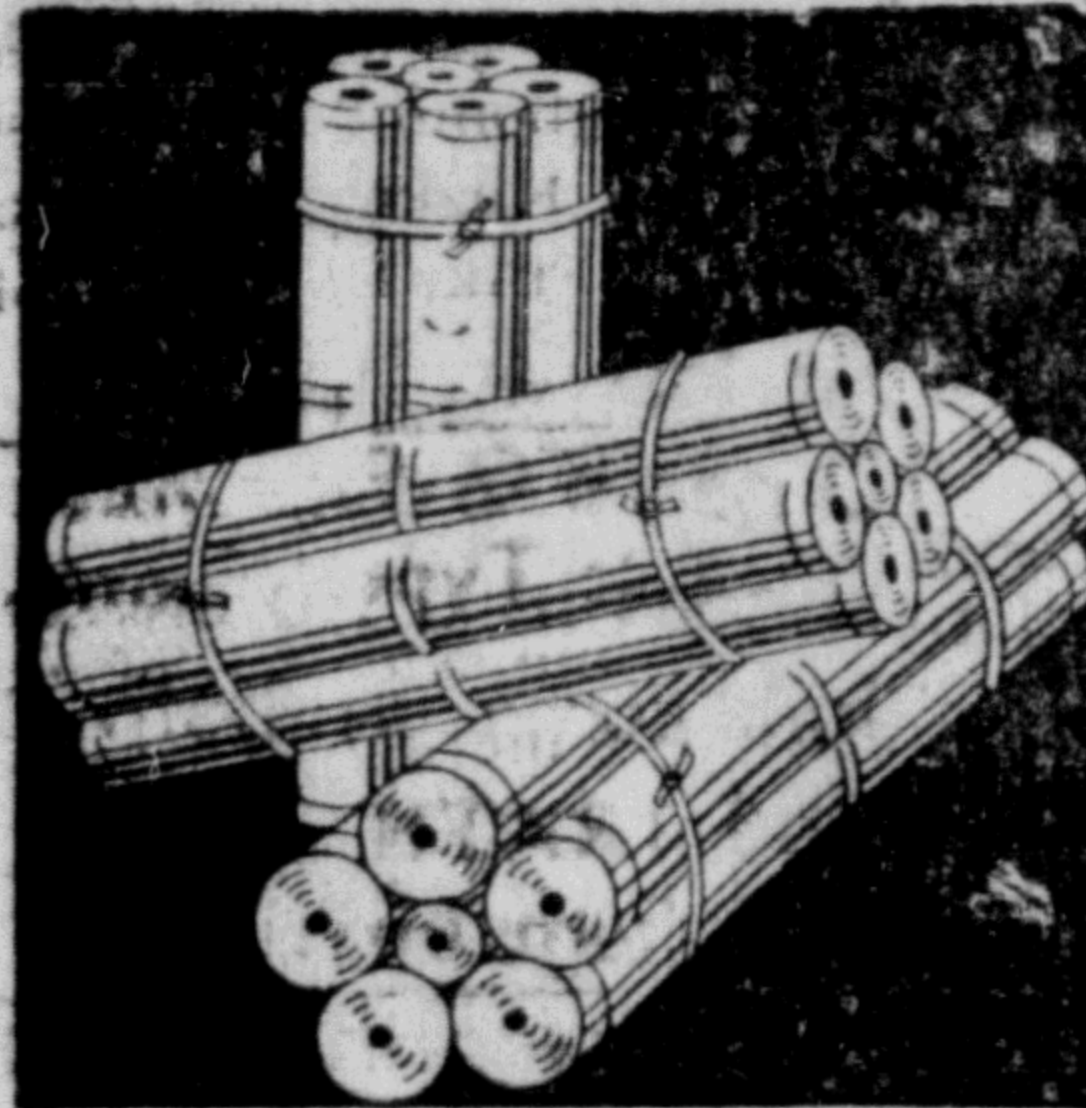


Pair Elect For Trial By Jury

Brownwoods Do Improbable, Beat Co-ops, Stay In Race

Its hats off to Brownwoods who came through with seemingly impossible win over the Senior Basketball leading Co-ops in last night's game in the Civic Centre.

The score was 56 to 49—and it was one of the most thrilling games of the season. And hats off to Reg Lavigne! His driving offense, his deceptive dribble and change of pace and his ability to intercept Co-op passes time after time made for one of the best individual displays of basketball this season. He never left the floor and was going just as strong at the end of the game as in the first quarter.

Bob Gill of Fashion was drafted again as a utility man for Brownwoods and it was a good move. When on the floor he shared rebounds with MacPhee of Co-op and played a bang-up game. He is a young player and in another year promises to be a stand-out.

Co-op was definitely off-color. They held the lead on several occasions but didn't have their usual drive. They missed shot after shot and their usual offensive play was not clicking.

They led 15 to 13 in the first quarter, 27 to 24 at the half and 39 to 38 at the end of the third period. Brownwoods came through with 18 points in the final quarter to outscore Co-op 18 to 10 to take the most dazzling game of the season by a decisive score. Lavigne was high scorer with 16. Shier made 11 and for Co-op Flaten was high man with 10. Referee Comadina and Slatta called 13 fouls on Brownwoods and 19 on Co-ops and kept the game well under control. Brownwoods made 12 of their 19 free throws and Co-op converted 7 of 16.

There are still two games to play in the Senior Division and Brownwoods could tie up with second place Bo-Me-III by winning from Co-op the postponed game of January 24 and witnessing a High School loss if Co-op takes Bo-Me-III in a postponed game of February 14. All this might seem improbable but Brownwoods have been doing the improbable for the past month and who knows, but what they will come out on top in the hectic scramble for the league's second place.
