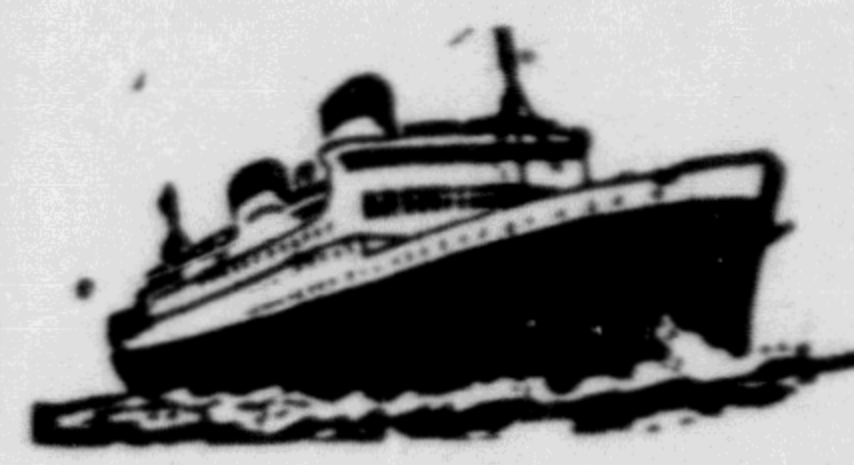

SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

Three coastal liners, well laden with tourist passengers although the season is now drawing to a close, were in port Monday. C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. E. B. Caldwell, led the parade, arriving at 11 a. m. from Vancouver and sailing at 2 p. m. for Alaska with another almost capacity list of passengers. At 2:30 p. m. Union Steamship Co.'s Chilcotin, Capt. Harry McLean, arrived with 76 round-trippers on board, sailing at 6:30 p. m. for Ketchikan, whence she will be back here late tonight southbound. Finally, C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. John Campbell arrived at 9 p. m. and sailed at midnight on her return south.

The big C. P. R. freighter Nootka, under charter to the Frank Waterhouse line, has been at Butedale during the past couple of days loading out a big cargo of 18,000 cases of canned salmon for delivery to Vancouver. Coming north yesterday, Union steamer Chilcotin made a special call at Butedale to unload cans of which the cannery had been running short.

According to reports emanating from the Vancouver waterfront, the C. P. R. has sold or is about to sell three of its veteran coastal liners—Princess Adelaide, Prince Charlotte and Princess Maquinna—to South American interests. Another report which has been current for some time is that the company is going to withdraw from the Vancouver-Ocean Falls Prince Rupert service which it has operated for so long and which for the past several years has been maintained by the Princess Adelaide. Queried at Vancouver, the C. P. R. said there was no service discontinuation or ships sold as reported.

Possibility of another steamship tie-up in Alaskan shipping has been admitted by W. C. Arnold, managing director of the Alaskan Salmon Industry, Inc. Should the tie-up occur, it would mean the suspension of at least half the salmon pack. Fishing on the peninsula, where the season closed August 12 approached a new low. There was no lack of fish but three weeks of wild weather placed the fishermen at a great disadvantage. A delay in reaching a fishing agreement was another unfavorable factor.

RAIN DAMAGES SKEENA ROAD

R. G. Van der sluis and John Pierce returned to the city last night from a week-end trip to Wistaria. They were accompanied home by Miss Clara Pierce who has been visiting with Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Mohr. The drive in from Wistaria—a distance of 386 miles—was covered between early yesterday morning and last evening.

Mr. Van der sluis reported roads deteriorating in the lower Skeena Valley, particularly around Shames and Salvus, following recent rains as a result of which they are now deeply mired. There is also a partial washout just beyond the Rainbow Lake summit and Mr. Van der sluis feels that there should be the greatest of care in motoring now.

SEWARD—Alaska is to have another newspaper. Paul J. Elms, a former Colorado printer, will publish a tri-weekly to be known as the "Seward Evening News". It will start September 1.
