Bo-Me-Hi Is Winner of Senior Basketball League Play-Offs

Booth Memorial Basketball teams capped all the silverware involved in Saturday night's basketball play-offs when the girls' team took the highly rated Dom's into camp by an 18 to 14 win in the Ladies' League and their Senior team made it a grand slam by pulling a thriller out of the fire to score a close

win, 44-42, over the league-dominating Co-ops. The Bo-Me-Hi Co-op game was a guaranteed crowd pleaser long before the first whistle sounded as evidenced by a near-full house, ninety-five per cent of which was rooting for High School in no uncertain manner. And the crowd was right as the game started out a break-neck speed that was maintained until the final bell. Both teams played bang-up ball with Co-op in the lead until the last quarter when the speed began to tell on the older team and when High School's plentiful supply of reserves literally wore down the Co-ops to the point of exhaustion.

Angus Macphee was again the stand-out player of the game and, in spite of being closely checked by Art Olson and Glen Carlson, was good for 11 points. He controlled play under both baskets and engineered many of Co-op's offensive plays. Jack Lindsay was the high scorer of the evening with 18 points but was off in his foul shots making only 6 of his 12 possibilities which of course is a good percentage but not for Jack who usually is a dead-shot on free throws.

It would be difficult to pick out an outstanding player from the High team as they all played a stellar game and their teamwork paid off in the last quarter. Ray Spring was high scorer with 11, Jim Flaten made 9, and Art Olson 8. In fact every member of the team contributed to the scoring column which added up to 44 points, just 2 too many for Co-op.

The High School girls' team proved that extensive and conscientious practising pays off. They came up from last place to down Peoples in the semi-finals and last night played a superior game throughout to take Dom's into camp. Only two Dom's players were able to hit the basket with Rusty Thain and Irene Kildal each scoring 7 points. Christine Currie made 7 for High, Webster was good for 5, Pavich 4, A. Hamilton and D. Kennedy each scoring 1.
