Are Leaving Prince Rupert

Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Watts Sell Home and Will Make Departure This Summer

Having sold their home on Fourth Avenue West, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Watts are making preparations to leave Prince Rupert following the close of the current school season. Their future home has not yet been decided but they plan during the summer to make a trip to Eastern Canada visiting such cities as Montreal and Toronto.

Having both been associated with the city since childhood, the departure of Mr. and Mrs. Watt will be roundly regretted. Coming here as a youth, Mr. Watts started as a warehouse boy with F. E. Hunt Ltd. business on the waterfront, later being identified with Fred Stork's hardware, the old F. G. Dawson wholesale house, and Frizzell's butcher shop and McMeekin's Grocery until he went into the grocery business for himself, forming a partnership in 1937 in the Watts and Nickerson business, acquiring the Bryant Co. business in 1940 and further developing it with a branch at Smithers. Relinquishing the positions of manager of Albert and McCaffery here, which he has held for the past two years, Mr. Watts will, however, retain his business interests here.

Mr. Watts has also been prominent in public affairs as mayor, president of the Chamber of Commerce and the Liberal Associations as well as being a hospital board member. In Masonic and Gryo Club circles he has also been prominent.

Mrs. Watts, the former Alice Nelson, has lived here practically all her life, being a graduate nurse from the Prince Rupert General Hospital training school.

HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I clean a white Panama hat?
A. Use a suds of white laundry soap, adding ammonia until the water feels soft; then add for each pint of suds one tablespoon of glycerine. Wash the hat in this, using a soft brush, lay on a board and dry in the shade. Or, clean it by rubbing with a cloth saturated with peroxide of hydrogen.

Q. How can I make a good mint salad?
A. Add some chopped mint leaves to French dressing and serve over tomatoes, lettuce, and cucumbers. It is an excellent spring salad.

Q. How can I prepare a remedy for poison ivy?
A. A little potassium permanganate and a little water is an excellent remedy for poison ivy. But have the solution prepared by a druggist.
