COUNCIL CHANGES MIND

(Continued from Page 1)

"I will not charge this council with being under pressure from this invisible hand," he declared, "but I do know that it has operated here before."

"This situation is not pointing up to dangerous ground," he said. "Anytime you trust the people, the people will show that they can be trusted. I think that they should have the right to an expression of opinion on this police business."

Alderman George Rudderham, seconder of both the original resolution and the bylaw, said that he did so "out of respect for a fellow alderman." While he had been a party to the motion, he intended to vote for the provincial police if it went to a plebiscite, he said.

In division, Alderman Casey, Rudderham and Morin supported the bylaw and Aldermen McKay, Brooksbank, Black, Nickerson and Stone voted against it.

Aldermen Nickerson and Stone had originally voted against the resolution.

The bylaw to raise a special one mill levy for park purposes was changed back to the original form in which it had been presented by Alderman Casey when it came up for first reading.

It will ask: "Do you approve of a special levy of one mill to be added to the tax rate for five years for the sole purpose of improving Roosevelt Park?"

It had been altered to include all parks two weeks ago but the aldermen felt that the \$5,000 raised annually by a one-mill levy would be no more than was needed to do a minimum amount of work toward taming the wild bushland in Roosevelt Park.

Alderman W. F. Stone opposed the change in the intent of the bylaw.

MRS. MURRAY POTTS DIES

Sister of James H. Thompson Passes Away in Vancouver

James H. Thompson, well known local merchant was advised this morning of the death in Vancouver, of his sister, Mrs. Murray C. Potts. For years her health had been declining.

Born in Nova Scotia, Mrs. Potts had lived much of her life in the west, having resided in Yukon and on the coast, for many years at Alert Bay where her husband, who survives, was in the customs service until superannuation. Since then, the family made their home in Vancouver.

A daughter, the former Miss Jane Potts, whose training as a nurse was obtained in the Prince Rupert General Hospital, is the wife of Lew Layhew of Vancouver. A son, Murray, lost his life in the war, seeing service as an airman. He perished on the Asiatic front while flying over the Himalayas. Another son, Gerald, is at home.

KITIMAAT WOMAN SUCCUMBS HERE

Mrs. Ada Amos, wife of Edgar Amos of Kitimaat, died this morning in hospital here at the age of 40. She had been brought to hospital on November 20. The remains were sent to Kitimaat today on the Camosun for burial, the widower accompanying them.
