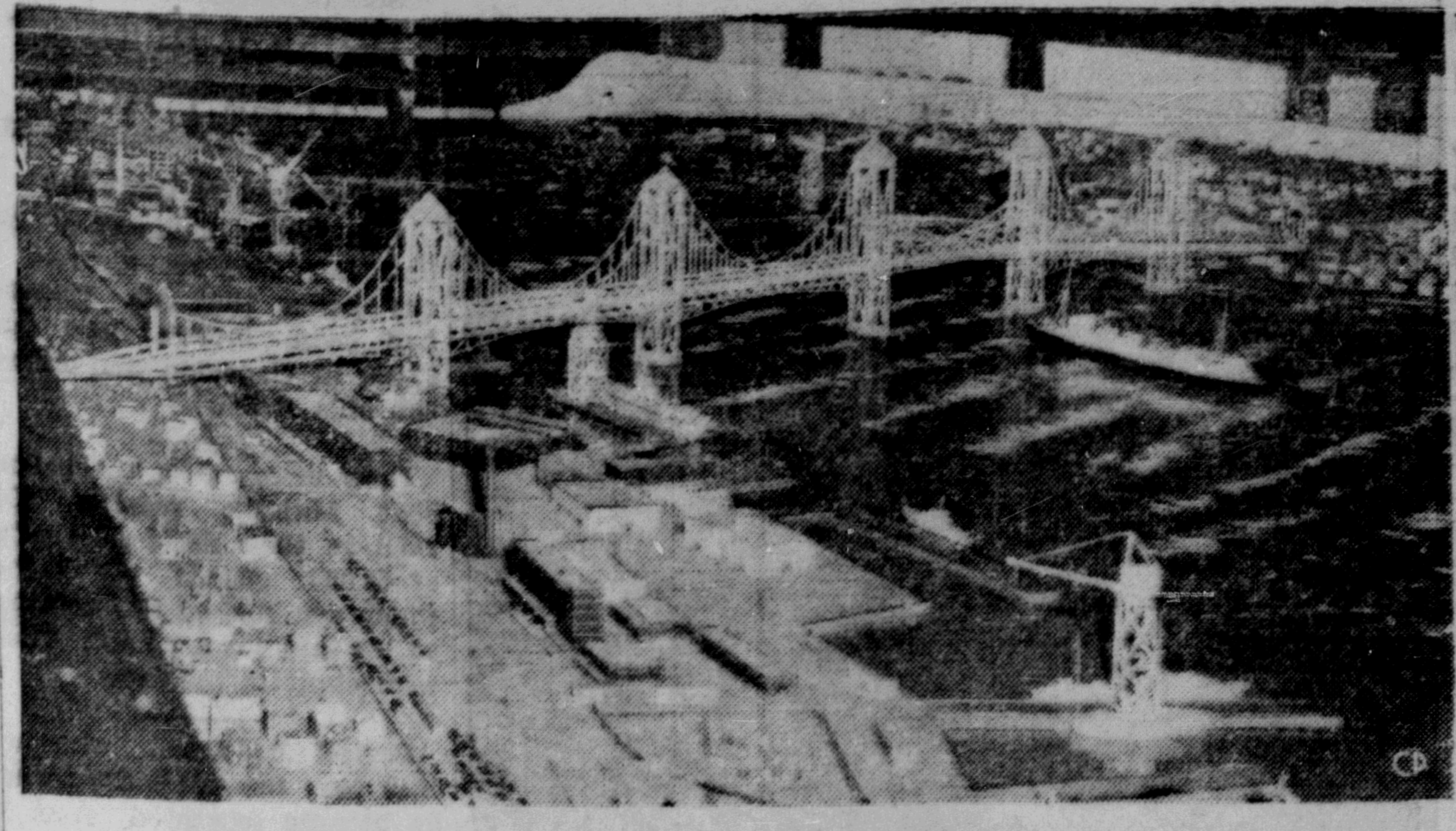

has written the final chapter to his own denouement. Members of his own cabinet are beseeching him to step down in the interests of justice. The cause of the rebels is just, and history will write the Chinese Civil War as the Great Reform Bill for China.

The late General Stillwell and other honest commentators have and are still suggesting the solution to the problem. The solution, they feel, is to grant to the Chinese the very political freedom that we enjoy and cherish here. Let the Chinese people set up a Democratic Republic government that will in fact and theory also be truly representative of the Chinese people. The fact that the Chinese civil war has progressed to its present state is dire evidence that the Chiang Kai-shek regime is unpopular. To have the present dictatorship replaced by another, Communist or otherwise, would be a very poor alternative. Our great neighbor to the south and other freedom loving peoples in the world can make history of which future generations may well be proud by insisting that China pursue the third alternative and set up a middle-of-the-road Republic government. If they do this, and if they aid in the reconstruction of a country whose history has been written in blood they will have championed a very great cause for a very great people. "STROMBERG."

METLAKATLA'S GREAT CROSS

An electrical cross, recently installed at Metlakatla, near Ketchikan, is eight feet high, its position being midway between the two towers of the Duncan Memorial church in the Alaska town. Putting it there was one of the most difficult jobs ever performed by the company to whom the order was given.

Painted white and outlined in red tubing, the cross is visible to mariners for a great distance and will be a great aid to finding Metlakatla in dark and foul weather. The red light from the tubing penetrates fog and rain better than any other color and this was an important factor in selecting it.

Rev. William Duncan, pioneer missionary, founded the original village of Metlakatla, just across the harbor of Prince Rupert about 90 years ago. Later, because of certain differences with mission work policy he moved away and receiving permission from United States authorities, started the second Metlakatla, this time in Alaska. It has developed into a progressive town.
