DANCE RECITAL IS HIGHLY PLEASING

A literally dazzling display of rich costumery, backed up by competent and original dancing, was the reward for an audience of almost 300 which Wednesday night attended the annual dance recital of Mrs. Mavis Colclough's dancing class in St. Andrew's Cathedral Hall.

Although small in number—the class numbered only 17—the group went through a program consisting of more than 40 numbers in a period of two hours and at all times met with a warm response.

Bright atmosphere was set by the costumes of the young dance students, all of whom were dressed in colorful cloths fabricated into dresses by family craftsmanship. Each of the girls had at least three costumes suitable to the changes of the dance throughout the program.

For the tap dance numbers, the students wore short dresses of glittering jewel cloth in silver, red and gold, while for the tangoes and waltzes, these were exchanged for gowns of equally reflected brilliance.

Full effect of the costumes was brought out by the cleverly arranged lighting effects provided by Allan Colclough.

The program opened when Canon Basil S. Prockter introduced Mrs. Colclough, who, in a friendly, informal manner, acted as mistress of ceremonies. She wore a gown with gold lace bodice with a voluminous skirt of black net trimmed with large gold sequins.

Mrs. Colclough contributed to the program itself with a top-hat-and-cane routine in which her evening gown was exchanged for an abbreviated costume of similar colors.
