**Sport Shots**

After a wartime lull, New Zealand's fishing is again attracting anglers from all parts of the world. Pre-war reports by anglers visiting New Zealand were often dismissed as fish stories abroad. Indeed, the facts of New Zealand fishing read like an angler's dream. Rainbow trout, introduced from North America, grown in New Zealand to sizes unknown in their native habitat. Fish of over 20 pounds have been landed and trout well over 16 pounds are caught frequently.

Fishermen can land trout from a cold-water stream and plunge them into a boiling pool alongside to cook. Though few anglers would choose to cook their trout in this way, it is feasible in thermal areas. Boiling springs occur in the most unexpected places, some even bubbling up from the beds of cold-water rivers. The government is conserving New Zealand's trout fishing as a tourist asset. Limit bags are prescribed for a day's fishing in the various acclimatized districts and the winter closed season is strictly enforced.

**COMPETITION RUNS HIGH IN MEN'S 5-PINS**

Men's Five Pin League bears a slight resemblance to a field of race horses entering the home-stretch, bunched so that the spectators cannot forecast which might break away as the pack nears the finish line.

**RESOLUTIONS FOR GAME MEET**

BURNS LAKE—At least four resolutions will be presented by the Tweedsmuir Park Rod and Gun Club to the annual convention of the B.C. Game Commission at Harrison Hot Springs next month through its delegate, C. W. Beck, who is also expected to represent the northern zone of the province.

The threat to wild life posed by hunters who operate from planes was stressed by "Buster" Harrison, a district trapper, who emphasized the necessity of limiting such methods. Opinions of the Attorney-General, who commented on the plane-hunter threat in Victoria recently were supported by a recent meeting of the Tweedsmuir Park Club.

The club will send in a resolution urging restriction of plane-hunting.

Increasing scarcity inspired a resolution for a closed season on all types of deer in the Burns Lake game district.

Mr. Harrison and Ernest Howard, another trapper, advocated a 10-year closed period for beaver. The meeting supported the idea and incorporated it in the list of convention resolutions.

Another resolution will urge that a bag limit of three grouse a day, with a limit of 10 for the season be placed in the Burns Lake district.

A resolutions committee was set up to prepare a number of other resolutions.
