



Barrel will be dropped from the Terrace bridge at 2 a.m., June 30, and will finish at a line just below Little's Mill at East Kwinitsa.

The main channel distance is approximately 50 miles. The barrel will be kept in the main channel of the river as much as possible.

Estimate of travel time is to be made in hours, minutes and seconds. Estimate forms attached to tickets.

Estimation of the time taken for the trip will depend on the following factors:

Skeena River current.
