

## 22 DEAD IN AIR CRASH

OLDHAM, Lancashire (C)—A British European Airways Dakota transport (DC-3) on flight from Belfast, Northern Ireland, to Manchester, England, crashed near here Thursday.

Police here reported that at least 22 persons of the 32 aboard were killed when it crashed. Earlier reports placed death toll at between seven and ten. Police report said that eight persons were severely injured.

A British European Airways spokesman said that the plane burst into flames after crashing. The plane came down at Cew valley in desolate country on Saddleworth Moors about five miles from Oldham and thirteen miles north-east of Manchester.

Tribute was paid to the memory of Jimmy Hopkins who died a year ago—players and fans stood in silence.
