



Thanksgiving Holidaymakers Amid Victims Of Tragic Crash Last Night

NEW YORK (CP)—The worst American railway disaster in years, a rear-end collision between two Long Island passenger trains, jammed with Thanksgiving Eve commuters, killed 78 persons, the police estimated today.

WASHINGTON (CP)-A sharp challenge to parents to reassert their primary rights in educating their children is made in a statement just issued by the Catholic Bishops of the United States.
