FILM OUTFIT IS STAYING HERE

Local Council Obtains Extension of Loan—District Representative Heard

Prince Rupert Film Council has obtained an extension of the contract until March 31 under which it has borrowed projector and equipment from the National Film Board to facilitate the showing locally of N.F.B. pictures which come here on monthly circuit. Meantime, the council will proceed with the campaign to raise the \$800 necessary to purchase the equipment outright.

The local council had a special meeting Monday night in the Civic Centre with Sgt. L. A. N. Potterton, the president, in the chair. Alex Wilson, district representative of the National Film Board from Prince George, was in attendance and addressed the meeting on the growth of the Film Board activities. He told the delegates that he had recommended that a block of films be available from the local library for distribution to outlying points as well as to the local Film Council. Mr. Wilson stressed how films could be used to aid any civic campaigns such as health, clean-up etc.
