## SENIOR MATRIC CLASS PLANNED

Principal Hurst Recommends That It Be Made Permanent Institution

Booth Memorial High School will have a permanent established senior matriculation set-up if the School Board follows recommendations by Principal A. M. Hurst, who suggested that the present year-to-year policy, based on the number of interested pupils is adequate.

Board members last night all expressed themselves as favoring the idea of having the senior matriculation service as part of the permanent school program but deferred making a decision on Mr. Hurst's recommendation. "I feel that, unless the senior matriculation course is established as a part of the school, irrespective of the number wishing to take it, it will never be adequately established," Mr. Hurst's report stated. "I would recommend that the Board authorize that senior matriculation be taught even if only one person wants it."

Under the present arrangement, at least 10 students must signify their willingness to take senior matriculation before the course will be taught. As a consequence, there have been some



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
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


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
