

ANNUAL MEETING—

**Terrace Board Had Active Year—1949 Period of Further Progress**

Commencing with a cold turkey supper followed by ice cream, cookies, cake and coffee the annual meeting and election of officers of the Terrace and District Board of Trade took place on Friday evening in the Credit Union Hall. Guests were introduced by Dudley Little, president, and telegrams were read from L. M. Felsenthal, P. H. Linzey and G. A. Hunter of Prince Rupert who each expressed their regret at their inability to be present at the Terrace meeting owing to failure of train service.

The year's work was cleared up and there was very little correspondence to deal with. Attention of Hon. E. C. Carson, Minister of Public Works, had been drawn to the condition of the bridges on the Skeena Highway between Terrace and Prince Rupert by a letter from the local Board of Trade and a letter was read in reply to the effect that the district engineer at Prince Rupert, Mr. Stevens, had been notified and the matter will be attended to.

As the Jasper to Prince George route for the TransCanada Highway had been advocated at Terrace three years ago, the Board decided to endorse a Prince George resolution to have the Yellowhead-Fraser River route as part of the highway. Mr. Sargent said that, as one of a delegation from McBride to interview Premier Johnson on this matter when he was here during the summer, they had been advised that the three western provinces must get together to decide the most advantageous route. The southern route had been strongly recommended but it was felt that the more northerly route was a tourists' attraction which could not be overlooked.

Announcement of the wedding of Larry Eckroyd, field representative of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, to Miss Hausen, was read by the secretary.

Progress was going on with the Columbia Cellulose across the river, southwest of town. A licence had been obtained to clear the streams of the Lakelse River and logs should be moving down very soon. Although it has not been a boom year, it was still a year of progress. There was a general stepping up of industrial activity throughout the district. The 1942 school enrolment had been 140 pupils in all. In September 1949 it had reached 310, while in December it had again mounted to 360.

Duncan Keir reported on the resolutions committee work. H. Philip for the membership reported that there are 43 members and 8 new members. Harry King, agricultural committee, said that this had been a history making year for the Board. Three hundred trees had been planted on the station grounds. The land clearing machinery had done good work in the district. The Fall Fair had been of educational value to the farmers of the district. They had received several inquiries from prospective settlers which had all been answered. One settler expected to come here from England in March.

S. Howlett reported that the radio committee had been fairly active this year but felt that Terrace was no closer to having a booster station. Mr. Deacon had been here to try and clear up radio interference and he was sending someone else early this year.

Mr. Robinson stated that the legal site had been secured for the Indian Pictograph near Tye. With the co-operation of Alex Smith of Smithers, the location of the sites and setting aside the grounds had been arrived at. Some sites are privately owned though some of the owners will sell.

A private campsite, 40 miles east of here, is underway which will have suitable sites for tourists to camp on their way through. A swimming pool is also contemplated there.

The speaker stated that an illustration station for Terrace will definitely be in operation this year and will be placed on the Van Stalk farm.

After seeing other parts of Canada, Mr. Applewhite believed that this part was most fortunate. The projects in which faith was being put were long term developments—the Columbia Cellulose and the Aluminum Company on which a business recession would have no effect. He could not see how anything can stop Skeena from going ahead.

Following a vote of thanks to Mr. Applewhite for his address, Dudley Little welcomed C. J. Norrington to the chair. The new president thanked all for the honor bestowed on him. He had previously considered it an honor to be a member of the Board let alone its president. He was very grateful of a good year having a good executive to work with. Following a vote of thanks to the retiring executive, the meeting decided to send flowers and a letter to Mrs. O. T. Sundal who is very ill in hospital. The meeting adjourned at a very late hour.
