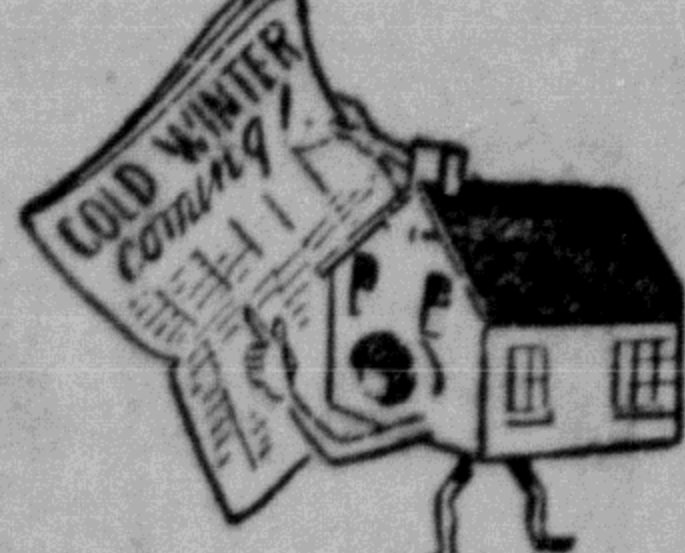

VANCOUVER (P) — Rescue on the high seas yesterday saved the three-man crew of the fish packer Elwee III after waves, whipped by a Pacific Northwest storm, punched a hole in the hull of the vessel.

The packer, stranded in the Strait of Georgia with water pouring into her engine room, broadcast a frantic "SOS," picked up by the fishboat London I which fought through a storm to take the ship in tow and haul her to a sheltered cove about seventy miles north of Vancouver.

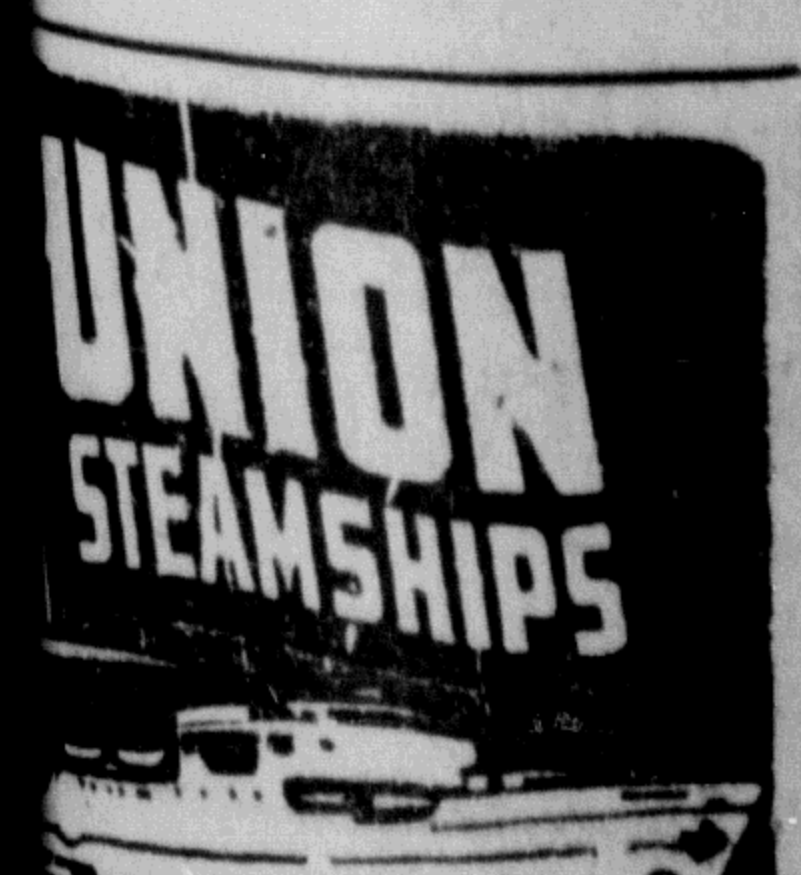
