

PRINCE RUPERT YEARS AGO

July 8, 1923

An appeal by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway against an assessment levied on company property by the city was dismissed by the B. C. Court of Appeal at Victoria. City Solicitor E. F. Jones attended the appeal hearing.

Minister of Lands T. D. Pattullo and Minister of Public Works Dr. W. H. Sutherland were scheduled to address public meeting in the Empress Theatre. The two provincial cabinet members were on a tour of central B. C.

City Council granted the Great War Veterans Association \$100 toward the cost of entertaining the crew members of the light cruiser H.M.S. Curlew which was exepected in the near future.

July 8, 1913

F. Kleven Hauser, head of one of the largest fish importing companies in Germany, arrived in the city on the Prince Rupert to make arrangements for the delivery of fish from this port He was accompanied by C. H. Jacobs, manager of the company's Oregon branch.




