In his legislative platform and he may well decide to try again this year rather than postpone his effort until 1950.

WILL TRY AGAIN

Despite a stinging administration defeat on the civil-rights issue early this year, Senator Scott Lucas (Dem. Ill.), Senate majority leader, emphasized that the Truman forces "lost none of its determination to try again." He gave no indication whether he meant in 1949 or 1950.

Whenever it comes, it will mean a filibuster by southern Democrats. They are the traditional opponents of civil-rights legislation—they contend it is a matter for individual state governments—and the filibuster is their traditional weapon.

SHUT-OFF ATTEMPT

George predicted there will at least be an attempt within the next few weeks to shut off debate. If that move was successful, the administration then could more confidently introduce controversial legislation such as civil-rights measures.
