### APRIL BOXING CARD PLANNED

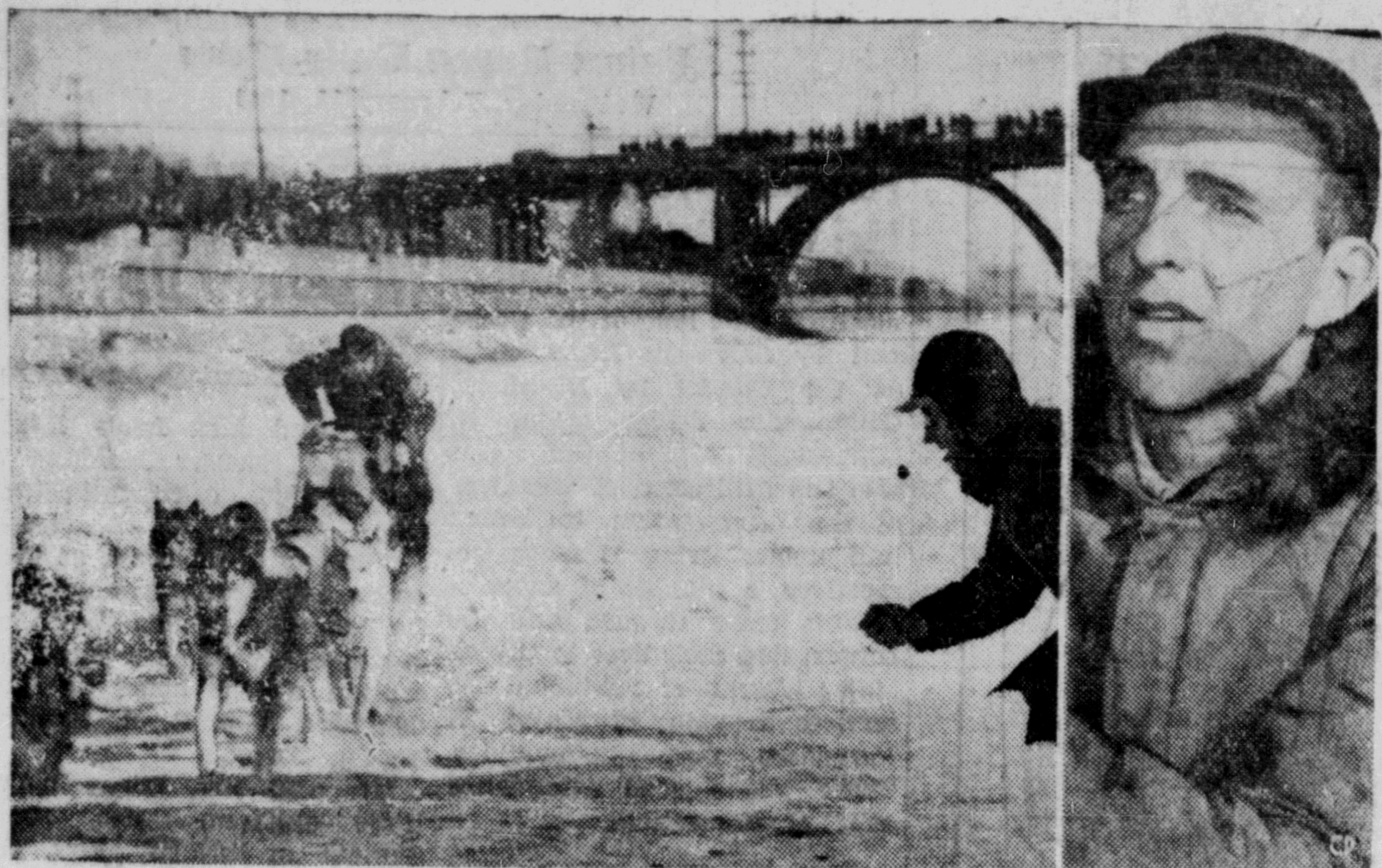
Trainer Joe Ward here has selected a group of lads who are rallying around him in real style, a situation that justifies his persistence. It was not always thus.

### Hockey Miscellany

The longest National Hockey League game ever played lasted 176 minutes and 30 seconds before Mud Bruneteau scored on a pass from Hec Kilrea to give Detroit Red Wings a 1-0 Stanley Cup victory over Montreal Maroons at Montreal, March 24-25, 1936. Overtime play totalled 116:30 minutes. The game start-

ed at 8:30 p.m., March 24 and ended at 2:25 a.m., March 25. Bill Durnan, of Montreal Canadiens, is the first goalie to win the Vienna Trophy four years in succession, topping the netminders in defensive play in the 1943-44, 1944-45, 1945-46 and 1946-47 seasons.

The longest unbeaten record in the N.H.L. is held by Boston Bruins who went 23 games with-

out a defeat. Record began Dec. 22, 1940, in Detroit, and ended Feb. 23, 1941, when Bruins lost to New York Rangers, 2-0.

Bill Cowley of Boston Bruins became the all-time N.H.L. scoring champion (total points) during the 1946-47 season when he collected 38 points to boost his lifetime league-play record to 543. This total eclipsed the previous high mark of 538 compiled by Sid Howe.

Sid Howe holds the record of scoring the most goals in one game, getting six for the Detroit Red Wings in a 12-2 victory over New York Rangers (Goalkeeper Ken McAuley) on Feb. 3, 1944.
