### HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I remove fat from soup?

WASHINGTON — Immigration visas given to Canadians last year totalled 24,000 against 23,000 in 1947. In 1946 18,000 visas were issued to Canadians and 8,000 in 1945. The visas are given to Canadians intending to settle permanently in the United States.

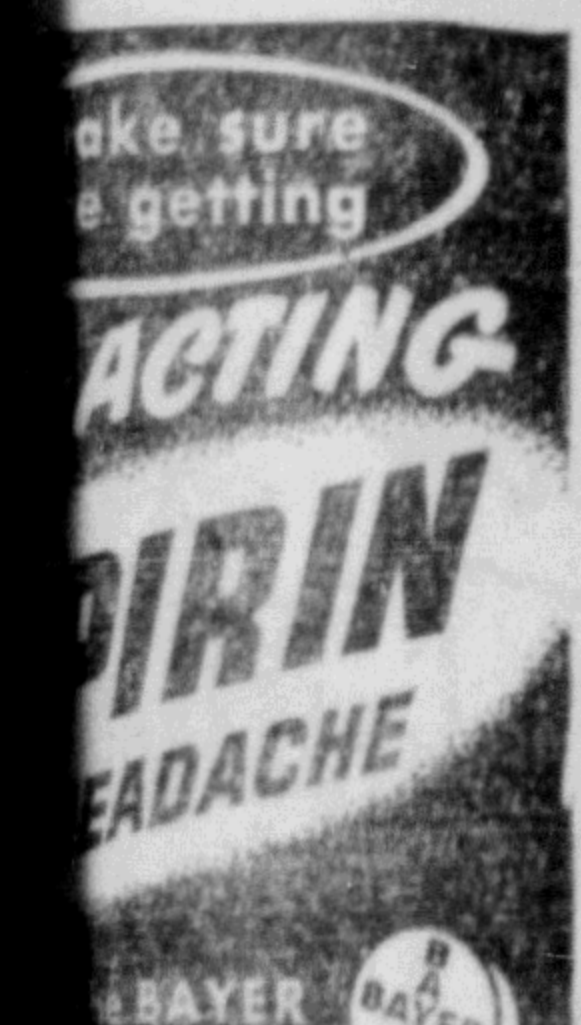

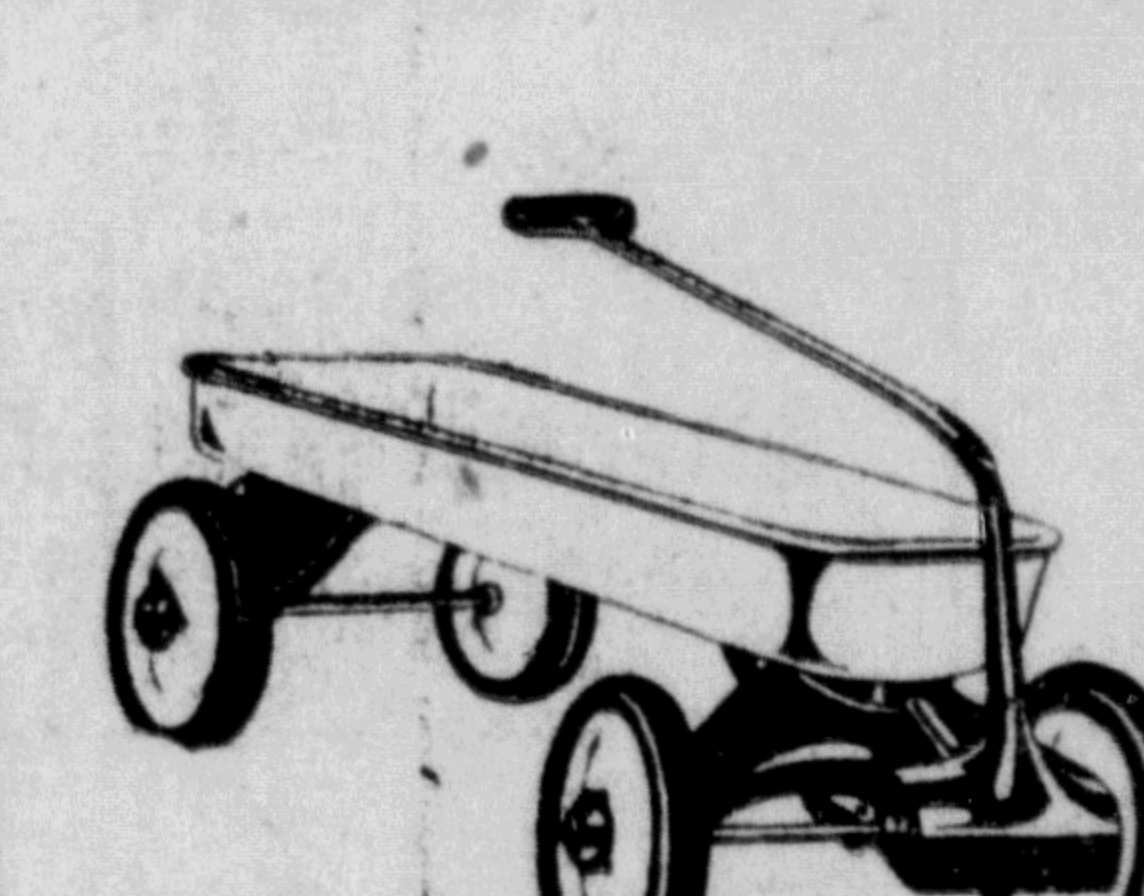
