Production Under Control Down Under

Since 1941 Australia has experienced so-called controlled production under a Socialist Government. Professor Copland, one of the Australian Government's "intellectuals," speaks from long experience and first-hand knowledge when he says:

"An examination of Australian figures available suggests that the increase of production over the pre-war level is in no way comparable with the increase that has taken place in the United States and Canada. In the United States a policy of decontrol has resulted in a rise of industrial output to 85 per cent above pre-war level. Australian production has hardly anywhere risen above 1939 levels, and in important areas is below them."

Freedom to produce means more jobs, more abundance to distribute. Socialist control of prices and production has nowhere produced as high a living standard as is to be found in Canada under our Freedom System. Our system is not perfect. It is constantly being improved. But by measured results it beats any other system thus far tried anywhere in the world.
