Agreement Made With Hospital

Arrangements under which the city will use a portion of Prince Rupert General Hospital as an isolation hospital and pay the hospital for the accommodation costs for infectious cases was approved by the city council last night.

Previously the city had operated its own isolation hospital. The building, however, has been declared undesirable for this purpose and an effort will be made to dispose of it.

Under the agreement the city will pay for the hospital accommodation of infectious cases at semi-private ward rate and reimburse the hospital for such additional expenses as are incurred by them, including payment for special nurses at the prevailing rates as set by the B.C. Registered Nurses' Association.

With the additional space now available at the hospital as a result of the addition of the former military wing for general use, a portion of the hospital has been set aside as an isolation ward.
