HARD-TOPPING CITY STREETS TO START 'SOON'

Hard-surfacing work on the block on Third Avenue between McBride Street and First Street would begin "shortly," City Engineer Don Stewart told city council last night in response to a query by Alderman George Casey.

Mr. Stewart said that Highway Construction Co., which has a contract to deliver 10,000 cubic yards of road gravel this summer, hopes to begin crushing asphalt aggregate in the near future. Deliveries of material have been held up for the last two weeks because of technical difficulties.

The City Engineer made his statements in response to a query by Alderman Casey as to why calcium chloride was not being used to allay the dust nuisance on unpaved streets.

"I gather that you are referring to Third and Seventh Avenues," replied Mr. Stewart. "We are planning to put a hard top on those two streets as soon as we get material. We cannot put chloride on them now because the moisture it attracts would affect the hard-surface."

"We have to keep the surface as dry as possible, so there is nothing we can do right now about the dust."

When the surfacing work begins, he said, it will require about 500 cubic yards a week of properly crushed aggregate. So far, the city has received about 1,200 cubic yards of base material.

DELEGATES, TELEPHONES TANGLED UP

Appointment of two delegates to accompany Mayor Arnold to two municipal conventions next month was deferred last night by city council until the aldermen take an official stand on the utilities committee's proposal for financing the reconstruction of Prince Rupert's telephone system.

Alderman George Rudderham asserted that, since the delegation also would interview the provincial Minister of Municipalities in an effort to gain the government's approval for a \$500,000 loan if the scheme is approved by council, the delegates should be on record as to their stand on the matter before being appointed.

"If the council favors the utilities committee's plan for rebuilding the telephone system, I think we should send down delegates who also have gone on record as favoring it," he said. "We can't do that until it has been voted on."

The telephone report will come up for formal consideration of council at a special meeting next Monday night.

Council went on record as desiring to send three delegates to attend the annual convention of the Union of Central B.C. Municipalities at Vanderhoof on September 3, the same group to continue to Harrison Hot Springs for the convention of the Union of B.C. Municipalities, September 7 to 9.

Following the convention, if the utilities committee recommendations are approved next week, the delegation will seek approval of the provincial government for a \$500,000 loan to renew the municipal telephone system.

Alderman Rudderham suggested that council take a vote on the spot so that the aldermen could show their attitude on continued municipal ownership of the telephone system "in principle." This was vetoed on grounds that the matter would come up for full discussion next week.

However, council did appoint Mayor Arnold, but failed to pass a motion by Alderman W. F. Stone naming City Clerk H. D. Thain and Finance Chairman T. B. Black as the other two delegates. Alderman Black was absent from last night's meeting.

PHYSICAL FITNESS—Better start in again on those early morning "push-ups." The health and welfare department has begun a drive to take the sag out of round shoulders and reduce the girth of bay windows.

In a pert little 23-page booklet called "Daily Does It . . ." the department's physical fitness division has lined up a series of exercises for the lady of the bulging hips, and the man with the kiewpie doll figure.

In fact "if you're physically fit—you'll be a big hit . . ." the department quips throughout the booklet which is composed of a series of exercises destined to test every muscle from head to toe. And in case you're not good at reading instructions, there are figures illustrating the different positions.

For that streamlined reconditioning it's best to begin by "sitting pretty."

First back up your hips in your chair so that the body is vertical to the chair seat. At the same time make sure your chest is up, and in line with your hips. Centre your head over your hips and chest, and pull in your chin and hold your head high. When you bend, lean forward from the hips, keep the chest up, but the shoulders down.

AFTER SHOPPING

For the woman just back from a day's shopping:

1. Stand with the back against the wall, and try to make the small of the back touch the wall.
2. Relax the body forwards and downwards as far as it will comfortably go. The lower part of the hip now is touching the wall.
3. Slowly uncurl the body,

Prospect Tuna Off Charlottes

Special Attention to Be Given This Area By Fisheries Patrol Ship

When the fisheries protection ship Laurier leaves Victoria this weekend on her next tuna patrol she will give particular attention to the waters off the West Coast of Queen Charlotte Islands. Fisheries Inspector Harry Burrow left the city today for Victoria to join the Laurier on this trip. He will assist in the actual tuna fishing operation so that first-hand experience thus gained may be passed on to fishermen of Prince Rupert and the north coast generally.

At the first of this month the Laurier spent three days off the west coast of the Queen Charlottes and throughout the length of the Islands from thirty to eighty miles offshore good evidence of tuna was found. Numbers of the fish were taken and released for tagging.

On the forthcoming prospecting trip the Laurier will continue to send in daily tuna reports by wireless and radio-telephone to Acting Supervisor G. S. Reade at Prince Rupert for the day to day information of local fishermen and others interested. Three broadcasts daily are made from the ship by radiophone at 10 a.m., 3 p.m. and 9 p.m.

gradually returning to an erect position against the wall. Press the small of the back against the wall while straightening up. For the man who has been sitting all day—here's an exercise which should make him feel as if he had just come in from a round of golf.

Standing erect, he should choose a chair-back or wall for support and holding on to this with the left hand he should stand on the left leg—on tip toe. Once in position he should swing the right leg forward and backward, swinging as far as possible and keeping the body still while the leg is moving.

The next move is to face the opposite way and swing the other leg.

"Be kind to your feet, so they will be a support to you in your old age," suggests the booklet's section headed "Watch Your Step!"

For correct walking toes should be pointed straight ahead—in fact the big toes should just miss each other. Socks or stockings should be the right size.

"Don't fence them (the feet) in," says the booklet. Then, tactfully "Men perhaps, need no reminder, but a word to the fair sex, a sensible but attractive pair of shoes for everyday is a wise investment."
