Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

GRANDMOTHER'S RECIPES ARE BEING BROUGHT UP TO DATE

Those who treasure an old cook book, handed down by grandmother or mother, know the special richness and tenderness of most of the old dishes. Of course these books contain the well tried "receipts" of friends and neighbors. It was not worth while writing out a recipe in long hand unless it had proven its worth as a family favorite.

Most of the old recipes for biscuits and cakes were made with sour milk. Lack of refrigeration assured a supply of sour milk always on hand. The leavening agent was soda which reacted with the acidity of the milk, producing feathery light cakes which were, at the same time, feathery light and moist. The old recipes almost always called for butter as shortening and eggs, at five or ten cents a dozen, were used liberally.

Modern living is quite a different matter so these old instructions must be adapted to suit conditions as they are today. Home economists have been testing some of the old recipes so that they are accurate in measurements and easy to follow but lost nothing of their quality.

Uncooked Fruit Whip

2 egg whites

¼ to ½ cup sugar or half sugar and half honey

1 cup fruit pulp.

2 teaspoons lemon juice

Beat egg whites stiffly. Add sugar or honey and continue beating until mixture stands in peaks.

Fold in fruit pulp and lemon juice, pile whip lightly in individual dishes and serve cold. Yield: six servings.

Oatcakes

1½ cups quick-cooking rolled oats

1½ cups sifted pastry flour or 1½ cups sifted all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon salt

3 tablespoons brown sugar

2-3 cup bacon fat

3 tablespoons water

Put rolled oats through food chopper. Sift flour with soda, salt and sugar, mix with oats, cut in fat until mixture re-

sembles fine bread crumbs, add water, mix well. Roll out to ¼ inch thickness. Cut in 2-inch squares. Place on greased baking sheet and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for 12 minutes. Yield: 36 oatcakes. Serve with butter.

Whole Wheat and Bran Loaf

1½ cups whole wheat flour

1½ cups cooking bran

1 teaspoon baking soda

¼ teaspoon salt

¼ cup brown sugar

½ cup raisins

1 egg

¼ cup molasses

1½ cups sour milk

2 tablespoons shortening, melted

Mix dry ingredients well. Add raisins. Beat egg, add molasses and sour milk and combine with dry ingredients, mixing quickly. Beat in melted shortening. Turn into a greased loaf pan, about 7" by 3" and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for 45 to 50 minutes.
